EUROPEAN.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 3.

European ambassadors were instructed to grant request of Sultan for a delay until to-day, but at same time to demand that the Porte shall order Riza Pasha to allow surrender of Dulcigno and withdraw Turkish troops from the town. A petition signed by 300 members of Ulema and a number of high dignitaries has been delivered to the Sultan urging resistance to demand of the powers.

ROGUSA, Oct. 3.

Admiral Seymour sails on the Helicon to-morrow for Cattaro, whence he will go to Cettinga. Great importance is attached to the admiral's visit.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 3.

Ministerial deliberations have been going on day and night for the past week, which have resulted in elaboration of plan for settling various questions pending with powers. This plan will be communicated to powers to day.

UNITED STATES.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 3.

About half-past nine o'clock this morning fire broke out in laundry of St. Charles hotel, causing damage estimated at \$20,000. First alarm created quite a panic among inmates, but order was soon restored.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.

A London cable special says a rumor is current that Sir Charles Dilke will leave Foreign office, taking the place of W. P. Adams in Board of Public Works, and that Leonard Courtney, M. P. for Liskeard will take the position vacated by Dilke. Courtney is proprietor of *Athenaeum* and an ex-contributor to the *Times*.

CHILI-PERU WAR.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.

A despatch from Panama says: "Chilians have plundered and burned Hacienda, houses and stores, many of them belonging to foreigners in and near Chibote, Sube, Payta, and proceeded to Libertad and Lambaque. The Chilean war steamer Cavadonega was sunk by Peruvian torpedoes in Chancoy."
