Wife Frees Trapped Lobster Fishing Boats

Fighting her way through heavy winds, a rain storm and heavy ice, the icebreaker COGS Wolfe, reached the side of the three small island fishing boats trapped in ice off Basin Head, at about 5 a.m. yesterday.

The boats became trapped in the ice early Wednesday afternoon, about a mile and a half off the east coast community, located about halfway between Souris and East Point.

Word of their plight was relayed to the RCMP about 5 p.m. Wednesday, and they immediately called upon the department of transport for ice-breaker assistance.

E. K. McNutt, local marine agent, assigned the Wolfe to the rescue, and she left Charlottetown about 9 p.m. Wednesday, following the completion of her mission, arrived back in Charlottetown shortly after 2 p.m. yesterday.

DANGER LURKED

The men, cold and hungry after their 18-hour ordeal during which the danger was always present that their boats would be crushed to pieces by the treacherous ice, were all aboard the Wolfe for some warm food and a rest before starting the trip into Souris behind the icebreaker. The fishing boats escaped with minor damage.

The three men reached were Alfred Surrey and David Johnson, Montague, Joe Dingwall and John Donovan, Fortune; and Andrew MacEachern, Big Pond, and Henry Peters, Bear River.

The three boats were proceeding together for North Lake, by way of East Point, to await the opening of the lobster season on Monday.

Man's Body Found In Ditch At Marshfield; Autopsy Set

The body of Russell William (Flash) MacDonald, 32, of Charlottetown and Montague, was discovered yesterday morning lying in a ditch at the side of the St. Peter's highway in Marshfield.

The body was found shortly before 9 o'clock by Cecil Stetson of Marshfield, who was driving his son to school. MacDonald was reported to have been lying face down in a pool of water at a spot, a short distance east of Marshfield School.

The chief coroner, Dr. L.E. Prowse, was called to the scene by the RCMP and after viewing the body, which is said to have borne no marks of violence, an autopsy was ordered to be carried out this morning.

In 1944 at Amherst, N.S., he fought Bud Johnson of Springfield for the Maritime amateur welterweight title and lost by a decision. The following year he went right to the finals of an elimination tournament for the Island amateur welterweight crown and lost to Jack Johnson of Montague in the final bout.
