

Detroit Tigers Batter Senators 18-7, With 17-Hit Barrage; Kaline Ups BA To .376

WASHINGTON (AP) — Frank House and Bill Tuttle smashed three-run homers Friday night as Detroit walloped Washington, 18-7, on a 17-hit barrage against Bob Porterfield, Chuck Stobbs and Pedro Ramos.

Billy Hoefl breezed by his seventh victory and the Tigers' Al Kaline boosted his league-leading batting average to .376 with three singles.

The Senators were dealt a seventh straight defeat and their 14th in 15 games as the Tigers unleashed their heaviest attack of the season.

Detroit splurged for six runs against Porterfield in the third inning, when House crashed his homer and added five runs off Stobbs to take an 11-0 lead in the fourth. Tuttle, who also blasted a triple and single, hit his homer off Ramos during a four-run uprising in the sixth inning.

Harmon Killebrew hit a homer for the Senators with none aboard in the 10th.

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Whitey Lockman's fourth-inning home run Friday night gave the Red Sox a 1-0 victory over the New York Yankees at Yankee Stadium.

Goetz, author of the New York staff's only two shutouts this season, did not walk a batter and struck out eight in the brilliant duel in which he yielded six hits and Pholsky just three. The Giant hurler now has a 3-3 record.

The St. Louis right-hander, suffering his third defeat against one victory, worked eight innings in which he walked one and fanned six.

Deny Rumors Durocher To Leave Giants

ST. LOUIS (AP) — General manager Dick Meyer of the St. Louis Cardinals denied Thursday there is any basis for rumors that Leo Durocher would leave the Cardinals to manage the New York Giants.

"When Harry Walker came to the Cardinals," Meyer said, "it was announced that he had been signed for the balance of the season and that we would discuss future plans at that time. Nothing has changed."

Durocher, in Minneapolis for an exhibition game Thursday, said "it just has to be no comment" when asked if he had heard rumors circulating in New York that he was going to leave the Giants.

"What's the use of trying to say anything else," he said, "one story would just start another one, so I'm just saying nothing."

Giant president Horace Stoneham said Wednesday night in New York that "there is absolutely nothing to the story."

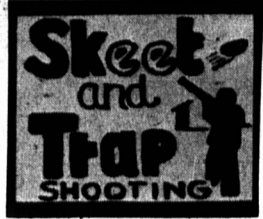

Dispute Over Cox Settled

NEW YORK (AP) — Baltimore and Cleveland have settled their differences arising from Billy Cox's decision to retire from baseball with the Indians receiving outfielder Gene Woodling and cash for outfielders Wally Westlake and Dave Pope.

Art Ehlers, assistant general manager of Baltimore, and Hank Greenberg, Cleveland general manager, met Wednesday with commissioner Ford Frick and baseball secretary Charley Segar to iron out their differences.

A large amount of cash that Baltimore paid the Cleveland club to make up for Cox's decision to quit baseball was not revealed.

Originally it had been reported that Cleveland gave about \$200,000 in addition to Westlake and Pope for Cox and Woodling.

Under the terms of the new deal, it is understood that the original \$200,000 was returned to Cleveland plus an unannounced sum of cash.

Frick had threatened to call off the whole deal unless the clubs settled their dispute.

The following interesting letter is from C. M. Alexander, Manager St. John Raceway, St. John, N.B.: "Last fall you gave me a boost about my ability to pick horses. Through my guidance Mac Lawson purchased six or seven on our trip. These horses were sold and I will give you the results of their races to date. Jimmy Hal 2.04% by Hal Dale, dam Little Nell. Won a three-quarter mile dash the past week in 1:36%, the first quarter in 30 seconds. Colonel, this is the best mannered and best gaited horse in the world. Roy Scott 2.09, a sound good mannered horse, he won three dashes to date, best time 2:14% and looks like a free-for-aller. Senator Quay 2.10, sound and perfectly mannered, won last night in 2:16%. Only six years old and a lovely looking gelding. Bolo Volo 2.15%, sound, good mannered, a picture horse. Won last Wednesday in 2:15%, only six years old. Donnie Spencer 2.09, good mannered grey gelding that is a race horse, sound and won last night in 2:18% with an amateur driver. Honey's Rasca, 4-year-old trotter by Arch Hanover. Raced three times and shows a lot of speed and when they get him balanced, predict a record of 2:15 of better. Good mannered and sound, also nice gaited.

"As you know, we bought these horses for a song and I honestly believe at least four of them could be sold for \$1,500 each. The Ontario Adam gelding that Buddy Wilson bought is a lovely little chap, he was second to Bolo Volo Wednesday night both trips. We have been getting big crowds to our races and the betting is now

close to \$30,000. Hardy Ganoag is doing a splendid job in his capacity as presiding Judge. Fred Throver of Stratford, Ont., of Grattan Bars 1.59% fame wanted to be remembered to you. I met him at London, Ont., on a trip in connection with the purchase of Ben Brook C. 2.12% and Allen Spencer 2.03%. Two local doctors purchased the Brooke horse and your friend Frankie Carr bought Allen Spencer. Best of luck. The paper Ben Brook C. looks real good in the 1954 Year Book. He started 34 times, won 10 times first, 11 times second and 6 times third and is eligible to the 2.22 class. The 15-year-old trotter Allen Spencer started 23 times last season, won three dashes, was 4 times second and 5 times third with winnings of \$5,496.25 and is eligible to the 2.05 class. Allen was campaigned by the famous Jimmie Cruise last year and competed at some of the best half mile tracks in the world. His age has not slowed him up very much.

Our good friend who supplies us with a lot of information for this column gives the news of the match race at Roosevelt Raceway last Saturday night between Adios Boy 1.58% and Adios Harry 1.58% for \$7,500, winner take all, with an added \$5,000 if they broke the track pacing record of 1.58% made by Hi-Lo's Forbes. Adios Harry won in 1:59 1/2. A \$25,000 one and one-half-mile trot on the Thursday night previous was won by Jamie 1.59% in 2:32.

Milligan Wins Golf Tournament

BURLINGTON, Ont. (CP)—Rae Milligan stroked holdly to the Ontario women's open golf championship Friday with a crushing 12 and 10 victory over Noreen Laing of Toronto—the most overwhelming margin ever scored in the 36-hole final.

The 21-year-old Albertan from Jasper Park let only one hole slip to the 19-year-old Toronto and district champion in convincingly completing a sweep over some of Ontario's and Canada's best women golfers.

Rae's power hitting and superb putting were simply too much for Miss Laing, who Thursday had eliminated a field of 19 in a championship Anne Shary of Toronto won. The Alberta champion needed only 28 putts on the first 18 holes, turning in an approximate round of 70-four under par.

Miss Milligan, a University of Alberta coed studying physical education has won her province's title three consecutive times, but had had little previous success in major competitions outside Alberta.
