Ch'town Native Dies In Toronto

TORONTO (CP) — John Stephen Lewis, 87, of Toronto, died in Toronto, Ontario, Sunday, May 13, 1962, after a long illness.

Mr. Lewis, born in Charlottetown and educated at Prince of Wales College, entered the Bank of Nova Scotia in 1914 and retired in 1958 after serving in branches at Saint John, Moncton, Halifax, New Glasgow, St. John's and Toronto.

He managed branches at Newcastle and Charlton, N.B., and was vice-president of the N.S. He retired from the bank while manager of the bank in Toronto.

His retirement was in the Second World War to sell victrola records. He later returned to job the brokerage firm of Thomson and McEwen, Toronto, and stayed with the company eight years.
