Gov't Paper Outlines Red Plans To Take Over In British Guiana

LONDON, (Reuters)—The British government has issued a detailed indictment of the leftist policies of the colonial administration ousted this month in British Guiana. The 13,000-word document, an official white paper, declared the People's Progressive Party had been carrying out step by step, the standard Communist technique for taking over control of a country. British colonial authorities called in troops and turned the PPP out of office earlier this month. The situation now is reported calm in the South American colony, but there are signs of a storm brewing in the House of Commons in London.

Will Be Debated

Labor members are expected to launch an attack on the move in a House debate scheduled for Thursday. The white paper, made public Tuesday, was designed as a basis for this debate. It accused Dr. Cheddi Jagan, PPP leader and ex-premier, his Detroit-born wife, Janet, and other PPP officials of spreading racial hatred and undermining policy loyalty.

It listed 11 main examples of conduct by PPP ministers which "showed no concern for the true welfare of the colony and had set it on the road to collapse."

1. Fomenting of strikes for political ends.
2. Attempting to oust established trade unions by legislative action.
3. Removing a ban on the entry of West Indian Communists.
4. Introducing a bill to repeal regulations governing the entry of undesirable publications and flooding the territory with Communist literature.
