Canada Widens Scope Of Officer Training Plans

OTTAWA, Oct. 30—(CP)—Canada, her fighting services increased by 40 per cent, offered new opportunities for potential navy, army and air force officers.

Defence Minister Claxton announced three main steps being taken to widen the scope of full-service officer training plans to fill vacancies created by the expansion of the forces:

1. Men in the ranks will be screened with a view to selecting those with necessary qualifications and leadership qualities as officer material.
2. The plan by which Second World War veteran university students might take officer training is being widened to include non-veterans.
3. The university plan also will extend to a limited number of students in science, engineering and the like who wish to have a career with Canada's Defence Research Board, which makes studies of the weapons of war.

Mr. Claxton said in a statement that "the recent increase in the strength of the services by 40 per cent" is creating a number of vacancies for officers in all categories.

Men picked from screening of the ranks will be qualified by one of several means, including attendance at the Canadian service colleges for men under 20, attendance at a university for men more than 20 or technical training in trades for tradesmen having unusual qualifications.

The Minister said that altogether Canada now has more than 6,000 men training under one of these arrangements as officers. In addition, at the end of the war, she took into the armed forces a number of veteran officers with excellent records and continued them with university, providing the fees with a "guaranteed source of first-class officers at relatively little expense."

"Now that practically all veterans have completed their courses, this plan no longer has application to them, but the experience gained has been so satisfactory that we have decided to extend the arrangements to undergraduates at the beginning of their final year."

In addition to training officers at Canadian service colleges at Kingston, Ont., and Royal Roads, B. C., every university has co-operated in the plan whereby undergraduates took on additional work during the college term. These men spend their full summers at sea, in army camps or at air stations.



Scout News and Notices

A hand-carved wolf's head has been presented to the Wolf Cubs of Toronto by F. W. Beatty, Surveyor-General of the Ontario Lands Department on behalf of Lands Minister Scott.

During the past two years 560,000 boys throughout the world joined the Boy Scout Movement. It was recently announced by Lord Rowallan, Chief Scout of the British Commonwealth, World membership is now 4,960,000, Lord Rowallan stated.

At the invitation of Viscount Alexander, Chief Scout for Canada, Colonel the Hon. Clarence Wallace, C.B.E., newly-appointed Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia, will be the Patron of the Boy Scouts Association in that Province.

Made by 19 Australian Scouts of the 1st Bureleigh Head Group in Queensland, a 17 x 15 foot carpet has already brought one offer of One Hundred Pounds in aid of the Group's Scout Hall Building Fund.

At the annual Mine Safety Association First Aid Competition at Salmo, B.C., this year, Boy Scouts from Trail won three prizes. They placed second in the Senior Novice Competition; first in the Senior contest and third in the Junior class.

When 374 Canadian Scout Leaders attended leadership training camps this past summer they established a new record. This year 156 Wolf Cub leaders attended these "Gilwell" Training Courses—the previous high was 146 in 1932; this year's 204 Scout leaders at Gilwell exceeded the 1932 record of 175. Fourteen Rover Scout leaders attended a Gilwell Course this year, the first held since 1938.

Across Canada Boy Scouts are working hard at advanced Scouting tests in the hope of qualifying for a place on the Canadian Troop of 32 boys to attend the Seventh World Jamboree in Austria next August. Only Kinz's Scouts will be eligible and the cost per boy, from Halifax to Austria and return, has been estimated at about \$425.

"Win With Winnie" Money-Making Slogan In England

LONDON, Oct. 31—(AP)—"Win With Winnie" was a money-making slogan at English race courses this year.

Thousands of race-goers followed the lead of Winston Churchill, the wartime prime minister, and his one winning horse.

And when Churchill showed up at the tracks—his fingers raised in his famous "V for victory" salute—the money went down on Colonel II.

Usually it was like money in the bank. The good grey colt—a French-bred four-year-old—started 11 times and won eight races, the last six in a row.

Churchill's purse winnings off the dappled grey were £7,202 (about \$20,000).

Churchill had never paid any noticeable attention to racing until he bought Colonel II in France in August, 1949, for 1,500 guineas.

"It was just a whim," a friend explained and nobody here thought much about it.

But the horse won the first time it ran in England. It won the second time out, too.

Then it came in for its share of political jokes by running wide on its first look at a track with left hand turns. (On some English race courses the horses run to the right, on others they run to the left).

With so much political talk about the "right" and the "left" Colonel II got a lot of publicity by refusing to turn left.

This year the colt was brought along carefully and a victory in the Jockey Cup late in October climaxed a successful season.

Colonist II now will be pointed for next season's Gold Cup at Ascot, one of the few races in which it failed in 1950.

Churchill has followed Colonel II faithfully, often trying from important political conferences in time to see his pride run in his colors of pink and chocolate.

Churchill later bought two other thoroughbred racers. One died without winning a race; the other, a filly, is still a maiden.

Four Tracks To Operate In Florida

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 31—(AP)—Four horse tracks will operate in Florida this winter in a racing season which opens Nov. 30 at Tropical Park, Miami.

Tropical will operate until Jan. 16, followed by Hialeah Race Course, where racing will be held from Jan. 17 through March 3.

Gulfstream Park closes the season at Miami with a season running from March 5 through April 20.

Sunshine Park, at Oldemar, near Tampa, also will operate after a reorganization and despite losses since the track opened three years ago.

The State Racing Commission awarded a 43-day meet to Sunshine, from Jan. 27 through March 17.

St. Paul's Gains One Player, Loses Two

ST. PAUL, Minn., Oct. 31—(AP)—The St. Paul club of the United States Hockey League has gained one player and lost two others.

The Saints announced purchase of Ronald Plumb, 20-year-old centre, from New York Rangers.

Plumb, a 175-pounder, played last year with Guelph Biltmores, Ontario junior "A" team.

Coach Clint Smith sent two forwards, Stan McEliellan and Johnny Flynn to Atlantic City, N. J. Smith said he felt the Saints needed a bit more weight and that the two forwards were a bit small.
