

Friend Of Buried

HANOVER, Ont. (CP)—Senator William Brust, one of Prime Minister Diefenbaker's closest friends and advisors, was buried Tuesday on a tree-shaded hillside overlooking the verdant Ontario countryside.

Mr. Diefenbaker stood solemnly at the head of the line of honorary pallbearers and Mrs. Diefenbaker stood with her arm supporting Mrs. Brust, an intimate friend.

The 59-year-old Progressive Conservative senator, killed Saturday in a car collision near his home here, was accorded the biggest funeral in Hanover's history. His, and his family's name is a legend here.

People began arriving at Trinity United Church nearly two hours before the service when the body lay in state. Rev. E.G. Cowan of Hanover conducted the service and Dr. John Henderson of Toronto delivered the oration.

Senator Brust needed no eulogy, he said.

SPRIT WILL CONTINUE
His contribution to the community, the church and to the state had been large, he said, and though now dead, his spirit will continue to be the principle by which good citizenship in all fields should be founded.

Mr. Diefenbaker, members of the federal cabinet, Senators Leaders Walter Aetline and Ross Macdonald and Speaker Mark Drouin, and district members of Parliament and the Ontario legislature were among one contingent of honorary pallbearers.

Another list of honorary pallbearers included the late senator's close friends.

Mr. and Mrs. Diefenbaker spent the day quietly — Mrs. Diefenbaker with Mrs. Brust and the prime minister at a private home which was put at his disposal for the day.

REVIEW EXPENDITURE

10 Doctors Expected From Britain
REGINA (CP) — New groups of British doctors were to begin arriving by air Tuesday night to provide medical services as the government and Saskatchewan doctors remained locked in dispute over the province's medical care plan.

Ten doctors were expected Tuesday night and a spokesman for the Saskatchewan Medical Care Insurance Commission said another 20 would arrive between today and Saturday.

Since the province's doctors withdrew normal services July 1 in protest against the government's compulsory medical care insurance plan, 11 doctors have arrived by air from England, two from the United States and four from other Canadian provinces.

At the bitter dispute went through its 10th day, spokesmen for a church group, which had sought to bring together representatives of the government and doctors under an expert mediator, announced no progress had been made.

The group approached both the provincial cabinet and the college of physicians and surgeons. It included representatives of the United, Anglican and Roman Catholic Churches.

Cutback's Announced In Lancaster Overhaul

It was learned yesterday that there will be an indefinite cutback on the repair and overhaul program on Lancaster aircraft at Enamel and Heating Products Limited, Charlottetown plant.

It could not be confirmed last night whether or not the cutback is due to the federal government's austerity program.

Meanwhile, a spokesman at Enamel's head office in Sackville, N.B., said that the Lancaster program here was ahead of schedule and, beginning next week Enamel plants at Charlottetown, Amherst and Sackville will be closed for two weeks while employees take their annual vacation.

The Enamel spokesman said yesterday that the company has been notified by Ottawa that the Lancaster plant will not suffer for inspection and further overhaul.

The Sabre jet program at the Charlottetown plant will not suffer a cutback. As the Lancaster and Sabre overhaul program was carried out simultaneously, no decrease in the present work force at the Charlottetown plant is expected.

Job Freeze Said Fatal

MONTREAL (CP) — Outlining their all-out assault on a demand for their 100,000 non-operating employees for a job freeze, Canada's railways said Tuesday the proposal would "condemn them to annihilation."

S. M. Gossage of Winnipeg, vice-president and general manager of the CPR's Prairie region told a federal conciliation board studying the non-operating demands that the proposal "is an absolute prohibition to progress."

T. A. Johnston, manager of the CPR's labor relations department, opposed the union demand for an end to contracting work to outside firms which the non-ops could do.

He said this traditionally has been a management right, reported by previous conciliation boards.

Mrs. M. E. Peveston of Colborne, Ont., chairman of the employment conditions committee, said in an interview at the federation's auspices.

She said the federation's provincial organizations must encourage women to protest against discrimination. Some clubs were considering inserting advertisements in newspapers to alert women to their rights to equal pay.

3 Persons Die In Fire, One In Crash In Nfld.

GRAND FALLS, Nfld. (CP) — Three people perished in a house fire here Tuesday night and another died in a car crash elsewhere but was injured.

Nikita's Berlin Proposal Gets Fast Western Refusal

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States disclosed Tuesday it had publicly rejected the Soviet proposal for getting Western troops out of West Berlin.

The state department also called "hypocritical" Khrushchev's criticism of American high-altitude nuclear explosions over the Pacific Ocean.

The department statement said the Russians broke the test ban and fired several high-altitude shots last fall.

Doctors Switch Terms In Churchill's Test

LONDON (Reuters) — Sir Winston Churchill, 87, has a bad cold in the leg he injured Monday June 28, doctors learned Tuesday.

The doctors for the first time used the term "thrombosis," meaning blood clotting, instead "phlebitis," a vein inflammation, to describe the condition set developed in Churchill's left leg after he fractured the thigh last week.

Thrombosis and phlebitis are closely linked but thrombosis is more dangerous because the clot impedes free flow of blood. The doctors made it clear that the fracture was confined to the
