Prince County Fish And Game Association Meets

The regular monthly meeting of the Prince County Fish and Game Association was held last evening at Kensington and the highlight was the presentation of prizes to the winners in the recent crow shoot. It was explained that a second crow competition is now under way. The prizes were presented by Mr. Stewart Jones president of the P.E.I. Fish and Game Association, to the following winners: 1st prize, Paul Hansen, Summerside, \$50 in cash donated by the association; he had 297 pair of crows feet. 2nd prize Owen MacGougan, Malpeque, \$25 in cash donated by Island Pheasants Unlimited and five dollars worth of sporting goods donated by Enmans Drug Co. Ltd.; he had 172 pair of feet. 3rd prize won by Keith Champion, Summerside, twenty-five dollars worth of sporting goods donated by R. T. Tolman Ltd.; he had 159 pair of feet. Consolation prize won by Norman MacLeod, Summerside, two boxes of shotgun shells. He had 16 pair of feet.

Mr. R.H. Found, president of the Association, was in the chair and said that the purpose of holding the meeting in Kensington was to create an interest in this district in the work that the association is doing. He reviewed the history of the organization with particular reference to the past two years since a new constitution had been adopted and the three county branches had been formed. He said that fish and game matters now come under the Department of Industry and Natural Resources and this department looks to the association to speak for this branch of sport.

Mr. Found referred to a matter which had been dealt with at the previous meetings in regard to the fishing of off-shore bass and said he had brought it to the attention of the Fisheries Council and that body had in turn asked the Fish and Game Association to produce any information it might have as to where bass have been caught. He said any such information could be given to him and he would forward it.

A motion was passed asking the proper branch of the Federal Government to investigate the damage that is being done to trout fishing by the crane and the American merganser or the shell duck. Mr. Found said that a crane had recently been caught in a trap which had two undigested trout in its stomach and seven trout tags.

Mr. P.A. Murnaghan, Deputy Minister of Industry and Natural Resources announced that the dams will be restored at Clark's or Marchbank's Pond on the Wilmet River and at Blanchard's Pond at Little Tigrish in Prince County. Mr. J.A. Rodd of the same department explained the

New Lighting For Block Of Water Street

One block of Water Street, Summerside, is to be equipped with new street lighting. It has been learned. The new lights will be erected on iron standards and besides producing more light will have a better appearance. The block chosen is the one between Central and Summer Streets. It is also intended to lay a new sidewalk on the north side of this block. It will be narrower than at present and will give more parking space. A similar job was done on the sidewalk between Summer and Spring Streets several years ago.

There is a long range plan to remove all wiring and poles from Water Street along the business section. To do this it will be necessary to obtain the cooperation of the Telephone Company and all light and phone connections would have to be made from the rear of the buildings which front on this street. As a start it is intended to remove the electric light poles from one block where the new sidewalk is to be laid. This work is to be done in the near future. -S.

S'side Federal Bldg. May Be Ready This Fall

It is expected that Summerside's new Federal Building should be ready this fall judging by the progress that is being made on its construction by the contractors, M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd. On the second floor the plastering is just about complete and only the finish woodwork remains to be done. On the ground floor workmen are just commencing to apply the putty coat of plaster.

This large new building on Central Street will house the Post Office on the main floor and on the second floor there will be the Customs and Excise Offices, Unemployment Insurance Department of Fisheries and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. A garage for police automobiles is provided in the basement. Foreman of the job for the contractors is Mr. Byron Crockett and the government inspector is Mr. Harold MacLennan.-S.
