

# Honors Dead during Speech

M. J. Mullin, guest speaker at the annual Remembrance Day banquet of the Summerside Cadets Legion last evening paid a stirring tribute to those men of the services who gave up their lives in the cause of freedom. Recalling the great leaders of the generation, he said that while they were great, they had not been called upon to give up their lives for the cause they held dear.

"The men we honor tonight," he said, "our fallen comrades, are the men whose names should be forever engraved in our memories."

"These men," he went on, "understood the sacrifices they would be called upon to make in order to preserve our way of life."

He warned his hearers against complacency and of too easily forgetting the sacrifices made by the fallen comrades. He said that members of the Legion must work to ensure that they are ready and will not break faith with those who died.
