### SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.

James Boylan Loses His Life Yesterday Afternoon.

A sad drowning accident occurred in Wisener's Mill Pond, Lake Verd, yesterday afternoon, the victim being James Boylan, the 17 year old son of Mr. John Boylan, of Auburn.

It seems that about half-past two o'clock, Boylan in company with two other lads named Harry Hermans and Gus Trainor, went in swimming in the mill pond. They had not been long in the water when Boylan screamed and went down, taking Trainor with him. Trainor managed to free himself from Boylan, and came to the surface. But Boylan did not come up a second time.

Boylan's cry was heard by some men in the vicinity of the mill. But they paid no attention to it, as they did not think it indicated anything serious.

A few minutes later the boys reported the drowning of Boylan, and the pond was dragged for the body which was recovered about four o'clock. The water where the drowning occurred was about ten feet deep. The accident took place near the mill. An inquest was not considered necessary.

The sad affair has cast a gloom over the neighborhood, and much sympathy is expressed for the lad's parents.

TO-DAY'S BOAT RACE.—The second sail boat race of the season took place today, and a prettier boat race has probably never been seen on Charlottetown harbor. Fourteen boats, as follows—all good sailers—started from a line from Connolly's Wharf shortly after half past eleven.

Five minutes elapsed between the preparation and starting guns, and the maneuvering for position was a pretty sight. The Kingfisher, Veda, and Flirt got over the line first, the others were bunched pretty well together and the Jubilee and Stranger brought up the rear. There was a splendid sailing breeze from the north west, and the boats went down to the asylum buoy in quick time. The course was the same as in the last race—twice around the harbor course. The Flirt quickly took the lead and when starting on the second round was a little over a minute ahead of the Report—the winner in many a previous contest. The race between these two boats was very close all through as was also the race between the Rescue and Stranger. On the first round the Rescue was third but she was closely pressed by the latter boat. At the end of the first round the Pathfinder which had her topmast broken was fifth and the Veda was sixth. The tug Nelson accompanied the boats around, having on board the judges and a number of others interested in watching the race.

On the second round the Flirt continued to gain and at the finish led by five minutes. The Rescue finished second, Pathfinder third, Report fourth and Stranger fifth. Time 2.55.

When a little to the eastward of Southport wharf on the second round the Jubilee swamped, and the crew were taken off by the Kingfisher.

The management are certainly to be congratulated in getting together such a large number of fast boats for the race, and although the start was made considerably after the time advertised, there were no doubt good reasons for the delay.

### TENNIS TOURNAMENT.

Interesting Contest at Victoria Park

The second event in the Tennis Tournament series came off on Saturday afternoon at the tennis grounds, Victoria Park: The weather was all that could be desired. As ladies' doubles are not often indulged in, this event was watched with considerable interest, especially by the gentlemen.
