LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Another Indignant Elector Speaks His Mind.

SIR,—The farmers of this section of the country have read Mr. Welsh's speech in the House of Commons, as reported in the last *Patriot*, regarding Red Point pier, with no small share of indignation. There can be no doubt that the object of this gentleman is to prevent any further expenditure on this work. What a model representative! What a lesson to the Conservative electors of this place, who, because Mr. Welsh was a resident of this side of the river, voted for him, believing he would work for our interests.

His attacks on the Minister of Public Works, because he spent \$800 on Red Point Pier, are calculated to prevent further expenditures on that work. If this wharf is neglected in future we will know exactly who to blame for it. Mr. Welsh says: "During an election contest, at a meeting which I attended, the Provincial Secretary of the Island produced a telegram from the Minister of Public Works stating that the wharf would be repaired. It was not then a Government work. I found they had taken it over for political purposes." Why does not Mr. Welsh tell the whole truth about this meeting and telegram. He knows well that the meeting was called for the day before the partial election for Queen's in 1884, and that in the notice calling it, signed by a number of his friends, it was stated that the object of the meeting was to discuss "local wants." He cannot forget that he and his friends insisted that the discussion should be altogether directed to the neglect of Red Point pier by the Dominion Government, and that it was not until Mr. Welsh and his friends had, in loud and long speeches, urged the people to vote against the Government as a protest against that neglect, that the Provincial Secretary produced the telegram which gave Mr. Welsh so much trouble then and since. Mr. Welsh shows plainly how much use he is to his constituents when he says that in 1884 Red Point pier was not a Government pier. Who does not know that every pier in the Island became a Government pier, in terms of the British North America Act, the day we entered Confederation? He ought, in all decency, to step down and out of a position which he is altogether unfit to fill. We might as well have a wooden man at Ottawa as William Welsh.

The Cultivation of the Lobster.

(St. John Sun.)

Newfoundland's new Superintendent of Fisheries is introducing Norwegian methods into that province. A hatchery for codfish is under construction on an island in Trinity Bay, and another is contemplated at Placentia Bay. The Trinity Bay establishment is to be larger and more complete than any now in operation either in the United States or Norway. It is expected to hatch two hundred million eggs each season, and is provided with a steam engine to pump sea water into the hatchery while the spawn are hatching. Rev. Moses Harvey, in describing the operations, remarks that the artificial propagation of lobsters is a more novel proceeding on this continent, but Mr. Harvey says is carried on in Norway with gratifying results. Superintendent Neilson is about introducing the method in Newfoundland, where the waters are already becoming depleted, although extensive canning operations were not carried on until after the work of destruction had reached its height in the maritime provinces of Canada. There are now thirty-five lobster factories at Placentia Bay, and this is the place where it is proposed to establish the first outfit for the propagation of these shell-fish. It is supposed to be an easy matter to obtain the eggs of the lobster, as they are carried about during a considerable part of the summer, attached to fibrils underneath the tail of the fish. It is not proposed to allow indiscriminate killing of the lobster in Newfoundland, in the hope of replacing the stock by artificial means, but it is believed that, with proper oversight and the observance of a close season, together with the maintenance of these hatcheries, the supply may be continued even though large numbers are killed. The question of the preservation of the lobster is one of great importance to Canada. A few years ago the lobster fisheries supplied one of our most important articles of export. The lobster ranked next to cod in value among the products of the sea. Last year the value of these fish was fifteen per cent. less than in 1887, while in that year the decrease from 1886 was still more marked. The lobster produce of New Brunswick, which was over 5,000 tons in 1885, fell off to less than 2,000 tons last year. The establishment of a longer close season, and the other precautions which the government has been compelled to take may prevent further deterioration, but will not in many years restore the supply to what it has been. In view of the present condition of the lobster fisheries the experiment about to be tried in Newfoundland will be watched in the Dominion with much interest.

BOSTON PRICES.

Eggs.—Receipts for the week 191 boxes, 206 bbls., 9,492 cases; last week 44 boxes, 675 bbls., 11,595 cases. There was a good fair demand for Easter, but since then trade has not been very active. Prices have ruled very steady, however, and the market closes with a fairly firm tone. Michigan is in steady demand at 12c., with other western at 12 to 12 1/2c. as to quality. Eastern extras are in light supply and firm at 13c. Island firsts sell at 12c.

POTATOES.—Receipts past six days, 35,000 bush.; previous six days 48,500 bush. There has been very little change this week. Arrivals are rather light but the supply of most kinds is fully equal to the demand. Fancy Houlton Hebrons and Rose are not plenty and hold steady at about 60c. A Plea of Guilty.

PARNELL GETS DAMAGES FROM THE "TIMES."

According to a recent London despatch, the *Times* has forestalled the decision of the Parnell commission, and practically put an end to Mr. Parnell's libel suit, by deciding to pay into court the sum of \$5,000 as damages. This admits the libel, and does away with the necessity of Mr. Parnell proving it.

It will then rest with the court to decide whether that amount of damages is sufficient. Mr. Parnell insists that the *Times* shall pay all the expenses of the defence before the commission, a demand that everyone outside the legal profession admits to be perfectly fair.

Attorney-General Webster has taken a back seat. He has had enough of Parnell, although he will remain to the end of the commission. But he will not appear in the libel case. The interests of the Thunderer will be looked after by Sir Henry James and Mr. Graham, while Sir Charles Russell and Mr. Asquith will appear for Mr. Parnell.

FINEST IN CANADA.—Mr. Duncan McIntyre is about to build at the top of Drummond Street, Montreal, on the property which he recently bought from Mr. Hugh McLellan. The house is to eclipse every other private residence in Canada, and will cost \$500,000. Mr. Thomas is the architect. Sir George Stephens' fine residence, it will be remembered, cost about \$250,000.

A WEALTHY BEGGAR.—A professional beggar named Felice Viart died at New Orleans recently, of debility and neglect, at the age of 72. She had lived there for over twenty years in the most abject poverty, supporting herself by begging. The coroner discovered hidden around her shanty \$38,000, \$2,500 of which was in gold, secreted in an old flower pot in the yard, and about \$36,000 in gold bonds, stocks and securities concealed in the walls.

A SERIOUS LOSS.—On Sunday morning last, Mr. James Dorsey took his valuable three-year-old Jersey cow out of the stable to show her to some friends, throwing one or two handfuls of oats in a tub for her to eat. She took a mouthful and began eating, but hardly had she swallowed it when she showed symptoms of choking. Mr. Dorsey at once gave her some water, which she easily drank, but the oats had got into her windpipe, and in less than five minutes she was dead. Mr. Dorsey, we understand, refused \$75 for her a few days previous to her death.
