ANOTHER VICTORY!

Another Seat Won from Grits.

A Grit Majority of 260 Converted Into a Conservative Majority of 200.

THE OPPOSITION PARALYZED.

TORONTO, March 14.

The revolt against Mercurier and Gritism is gathering force throughout Ontario. In Monck on Saturday the Grit majority of 260 was wiped out. Mr. Arthur Boyle was again the Conservative candidate, and as nearly all the bye-elections, a great victory was scored for the Ministerialist. Boyle's majority is 290.

The Conservatives themselves are quite surprised over the brilliant and unexpected triumph. The Empire said on Saturday that "as the Grit majority was 260, surely they will be able to hold their own."
