

# Eisenhower's Re-election Pleases U.S. Business

NEW YORK (AP)—Business in the United States Wednesday took another nip of the brew of confidence.

The Eisenhower victory is widely expected to firm up the plans for expansion. That in turn may step up inflationary pressure.

The stock markets may do a few nip-ups for awhile—some celebrating, some cashing in on good guesses or erasing bad ones. But later on war scares and peace scares are likely to be more on the mind of stock traders than the vote of "no change" which the American electorate gave the executive and legislative branches of its government.

**IKE HELPS BUSINESS**

Confidence in domestic affairs comes from this:

Rightly or wrongly, most leaders of industry and trade feel that with the Eisenhower team running

the executive branch the climate for business will be favorable.

Leadership in Congress remains largely in the hands of the conservative wing of the Democratic party.

The outlook then for the next two years is much the same as in the last two years, which by and large business found to its liking.

But business still has plenty at stake in Washington. The campaign pointed up a number of issues sharply dividing public opinion: tight money, the farm problem, small business, tariffs, labor policy. And business has as big a stake as any one in foreign policy.

**HOPE TAX RELIEF**

Hope still burns, if flickeringly, for some tax relief—particularly for small business and perhaps for individuals if prosperity continues to swell the U.S. treasury's take.

Most businessmen look for still larger government expendi-

tures after Congress convenes. For one thing, the disturbing news from Eastern Europe and the Middle East will put starch in the defence department's plans to ask for \$2,000,000,000 more in appropriations.

The president has promised that in January he will ask for more domestic spending: federal aid for school building as well as aid for economically depressed regions, like those of the anthracite coal fields.

Fear of further inflation will haunt many businessmen, especially if a new wave of confidence in the future should be translated into speculative buildup of inventories or of expansion of plants beyond the ready plans that industry already has outlined.

The Eisenhower team, however, is expected to continue its attempts to hold off inflation by a policy of tight credit and dear money.

MONCTON, N.B. — Thirteen carloads of prize livestock arrived here Wednesday from the Maritime Provinces for exhibit at the Royal Winter Fair.

J.W. MacLachlan, agricultural agent of the Canadian National Railway in the Atlantic Region said that many of the cattle had taken top awards at the Maritime Winter Fair which has just ended at Amherst.

## Halifax Symphony To Play Colourful Numbers At Q. C. H.

A musical event of unusual interest to the City and Province is the forthcoming concert by the Halifax Symphony on Tuesday, November 13th. Two programs will be given at the Queen Charlotte High School Auditorium at 2:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. The afternoon program is primarily for students featured by the conductor describing the pieces being played and the part each musical instrument plays in them.

The evening program consists of four popular orchestral numbers which make for easy and pleasant listening for those not familiar with symphonic music. The combination of strings, instruments, horns and wind instruments and drums is an exciting one.

The first number on the evening's program is the Overture to one of the most popular of operatic overtures, and is played by every imaginable combination of players—such as pianists, flutists, brass and rhythm bandmen, and so on. It is 19th century French heroic opera and its famous prayer (like that of Rossini's "William Tell") is often used as a hymn tune in churches.

The second number, the Scottish, A. major, Symphony of Mendelssohn (together with the Hebrides and Fingal's Cave Overtures) owes its existence to a visit paid by the composer to Scotland. In these works Mendelssohn is shown to possess a particularly happy and sparkling sense of melody and orchestration.

The third number is the Serenade, Eine Kleine Nachtmusik K. 525 by Mozart. This Serenade (A little Music at Night) is written for the strings only. It is a series of charming movements recalling the days of powder and patch, wind and rattle, and brings to mind all the elegance and ease of an 18th century drawing room.

Two Afrikaans Songs for Chorus and Orchestra by John Lea-Morgan make up the fourth number on the program. Mr. Lea-Morgan was born in Johannesburg, South Africa, and wrote these two songs for the South African Broadcasting Corporation. They are settings of words by Afrikaans poets and are of a national and patriotic character. They were awarded the South African Musical Society's gold medal at the Cape Town Music Festival. He is now organist and choir director at Zion Church, Charlottetown.

The final number, the Polovtsienne Dances of Borodin, bring to mind all the bizarre, colourful excitement of the East, so well understood and portrayed by Rus-

sian Composers. The dances occur as a ballet in the Opera, "Prince Igor", and together with the accompanying strings create an impression of overwhelming opulence and splendour at the court of Khan Koshchak. The opening number (like that of other classical works) has now found its way, or rather been forced into, the efforts of night club bands, crooners, and the like.

This community project is being sponsored by the following Home and School Associations: Southport, Parkdale, Spring Park, Queen Square School, Rochford Square School, West Kent School, Prince Street School and Queen Charlotte High School. Generous support has also been received from local business firms to make the effort a financial success.

It is hoped that the general public will extend its patronage to these programs. This is the only opportunity available in the Atlantic Provinces to hear and see in person skilled musical artists interpreting the universal language of music.
