Remand Accused To Nov. 5 On Three Separate Charges

SUMMERSIDE—A Cape Traverse man, Sheldon James O'Halloran, was remanded to Nov. 5, when he appeared before magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Magistrate's court yesterday morning on three separate charges. O'Halloran entered pleas of guilty to charges of impaired driving, leaving the scene of an accident and driving while his license was suspended. Col. W. R. MacDonell, NCO in charge of the Borden RCMP detachment, told the court that the accused had struck a 1953 model vehicle which stopped at the intersection on the morning of Oct. 30, causing approximately \$150 damage. While being pursued O'Halloran ditched his own vehicle, the officer said. Leo O'Halloran of Cape Traverse pleaded not guilty to a charge of obstructing a police officer and his case was adjourned to Nov. 26. Bruce Bradford Clark, Augustine Cove, Ernest Andrew Arsenault, Summerside, Allison Mann, Kensington and James Gabriel Gallant, Summerside, were each fined \$75 and costs when they appeared before magistrate MacDonald on similar charges of impaired driving. A Kensington resident was fined \$20 and costs on a charge of illegal possession of liquor.

Winnipeg Priest At Vatican Is Known Here

A native of St. Margaret's and graduate of St. Dunstan's University, was one of 38 parish priests from more than a dozen countries who have been admitted to the secret sessions of the Vatican Ecumenical Council. He is Very Rev. James MacIsaac, pastor of Winnipeg's St. Mary's Cathedral. The priests are the first allowed into St. Peter's Basilica to observe the council deliberations. Father MacIsaac, founding pastor of Our Lady of Victory Memorial parish, Winnipeg, was appointed rector of St. Mary's Cathedral Parish, Winnipeg, in June, 1962. He earned degrees in arts, theology and canon law, and was professor at St. Paul's College. He was editor of the Northwest Review and served six years as an army chaplain, retiring with the rank of lieutenant colonel. A sister, Mrs. A. MacDonnell, lives in Souris.

High Percentage Impaired Cases Noted In Report

GEORGETOWN—In his address to a grand jury Tuesday at the November sitting of Kings County Supreme Court, presiding judge Mr. Justice R. B. Bell noted that the jail report covering the May 5 to Nov. 3 period for this year showed 172 persons had been in custody. Of this number a total of 42 persons had been charged with impaired driving, and seven persons, charged with care and control while impaired, said Mr. Justice Bell. The grand jury inspected the Kings County courthouse and jail, and made the following report: "On the grand jury, in session at Georgetown, P.E.I., have inspected the courtroom, judge's chambers, and jail, and wish to report that on the whole this building is in satisfactory condition, but would recommend the following: 29 Crown witnesses by a Grand Jury, Tuesday, which returned a true bill. Mr. Justice Bell, in his address to the grand jury, instructed on general points of law. Members of the grand jury were: Foreman, Bruce Stewart, Souris; Roy Farquharson, Canavon; P. E. Harris, Guernsey Cove; Stanley Burke, New Perth; George Bowry, Midgell; Albert Griffin, Souris; James Gordon, Abney; Harold McEwen, Rollo Bay; Chester Whiteaway, Dover; Raymond D. Sweeney, Elmira. The defendant, Mr. Dumphy, was charged in that "on or about June 7, 1964 at Souris Line Road, Kings County (he) did unlawfully cause the death of George Anthony Longanpich by criminal negligence, in showing wanton or reckless disregard for the lives or safety of other persons in that he drove a motor vehicle on the highway while his ability to do so was impaired by alcohol, and by not having the said motor vehicle under proper control, contrary to the Criminal Code of Canada." 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

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


