A GENERAL ADVANCE AND ASSAULT ALONG THE LINE—MISCELLANEOUS MUSIC—TESTIMONY OF A THREE WEEKS SOLDIER—"ROLL THE OLD CHARIOT ALONG."

The Salvation Army on Sunday had its usual muster, procession, kneel drill, and attack on Satan's kingdom. The muster took place at the Barracks, Little Richmond-street, at 7 15, Lieut Nellie Kiezer in command. At that time there were about 100 persons in the Hall. Children were running up and down the gallery steps where the soldiers sit, the fife was engaged in trying a few of his favourite airs. A boy with a mysterious instrument of awful discord, called the ocarina, was making the place hideous with din, soldiers were chattering merrily, a girl with the tambourine now and again manifested her dexterity with that peculiar instrument, the cymbals added their quota to their unharmonious proceeding, and the scraping of fiddles out of tune completed the mixture of discordant sounds. At last some kind of order was brought out of the chaos, the band struck up a lively tune, and a few soldiers followed with

When the battle's over, We shall wear a crown In the New Jerusalem.

Lieut. Kiezer now entered the barracks rapidly marched up the aisle, gave the tambourine a dexterous thrump, advanced to the front, knelt down, and prayed briefly that the Lord would be with them in their parade, give them a good meeting, and save precious souls. The procession was then formed and the streets were paraded. When the party returned Lieut. Kiezer commenced

My sins are washed away By the blood of the Lamb.

The triangle chimed in slowly, the fiddles doubtfully follow, and cymbals crash in, but still there was an evident lagging. All the soldiers were not singing, and only a few of the audience joined in. The leader then called for "knee drill," and her invocation was direct to the point. "Oh, Lord," said she, "we are glad we are here to-night. We are glad we are in Thy company. We are glad to be with Jesus, and we ask Thee to come right down among us. Oh, God Almighty, come in our midst to-night. Oh come in our midst to-night and save sinners here. Oh come to-night and speak right to their hearts and wash away all their sins. Help them Lord to come to Thee to-night, and confess Thee before this meeting, and take right hold of Thee by faith, Oh, Lord, save souls to-night here for Jesus sake." Lieut. Nellie Kiezer then mounted the platform and commenced singing:—

I heard the voice of Jesus say Come unto Me and rest.

She was dressed in a tight-fitting scarlet cloth jacket, if it did not show her to be the "glass of fashion," demonstrated that she was not far from the "mould of form." Several more players followed, interspersed with various songs which were more or less heartily joined in by the audience.

READING THE WORD.

The Lieutenant then announced that she would read Isaiah lv., and in doing so she interspersed remarks. "Seek ye the Lord while he may be formed. You will wish some day that you had come if you neglect this great Salvation. Come now to-night, while you are in your health and strength, and seek the Lord. I am glad He is here to-night—bless him (amen). For My thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways My ways." Now, there are a great many of you that get saved in your own way. It may be right at home, when nobody but you and God are there; but Jesus says here, "My ways are not your ways." Oh call on Jesus to-night and get saved. The mountains and the hills shall break forth before you into singing, all the trees of the field shall clap their hands. That will be a noisy meeting when the mountains start into singing and the trees clap their hands. You think the Salvation Army is noisy, but when we get up yonder there we will then start into shouting."

HOW TO PROVIDE THE BANQUET.

The Lieutenant then gave out the announcement relating to the first anniversary of the Salvation Army in Canada, and asked for contributions in jink. "The people will be hungry," said she, "and I want you to send on your contributions, no matter what it is, and the Lord will bless you. You come here Sunday after Sunday and are getting good all the time, and you ought to send something, no matter what it is—a barrel of flour, a cow or a pig. (Laughter.) If you cannot send something give us some money. We Salvation folks haven't got a cent—I know I haven't—and you people have got to pay for these barracks." A dollar was handed up, and for a time the giving flagged. "Be careful that God don't make you pay a great doctor's bill, for you know that all that you got belongs to him." The money came a little more freely, and she sang:—

Roll the old chariot along, If the devil's in the way roll it over him

HOPE FOR ALL.

Experiences were then the order of the day, and a soldier of three weeks' standing gave an intelligent statement of his experience, and strongly urged the many young men in the audience who knew him to give their

hearts to Jesus. Another exhorted singers to give the Lord a trial, "for," said he, "the devil will take you back any time you want to go." Another said he was a faithful backslider—a backslider from the devil. I believe the devil has got very little show among the Salvation Army. The Lord can save everybody, and if the devil was to turn God would save him." after these expressions an assault was made on the people, the Army was spread out in skirmishing order,

What wonders God to us hath given, Salvation wires from earth to heaven. was sung, and a general jubilee closed the proceedings. The hall was about three-fourths full, this comparatively small attendance being due possibly to the fact that there was a silver collection at the door.
