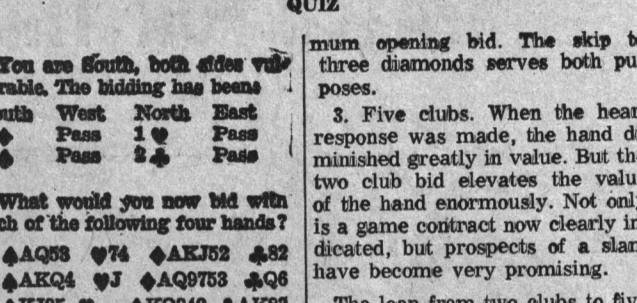

1. Two diamonds. The choice
lies between two diamonds and a
two notrump. Having opened the
bidding with close to a minimum
hand, which has not gotten any
better with partner bidding suits
we don't fit, the limited strength
should be identified. We want to
slow down partner who up to now
does not know how weak or
strong our hand is.

A two notrump bid would show
greater interest in reaching
game.

If the queen of hearts or clubs
were added to the hand, a two not-
rump bid would become proper.

2. Three diamonds. North has
made two forcing bids. Naturally,
we assume there is a game, and
perhaps a slam, somewhere. But
since 6-4-2-1 distribution does not
lend itself to notrump play, we
want to impress on partner the
unbalanced nature of our hand.
At the same time we want to
show that our high card values
are well above those of a mini-

**B.C. Takes Keen Interest
As Alaska To Become State**

VANCOUVER (CP) — British
Columbia is watching the
emergence of Alaska from the status
of territory to a U.S. state with
more than neighborly interest.

Plans are already under way
for an official visit by Premier
Bennett, as soon as Alaska official-
ly becomes the 49th state,
possibly in six months.

Alaska, with an area of 586,400
square miles, or one-fifth the size
of the United States and a third
as large again as B.C., is mainly
situated well to the north of the
province. But Alaska and B.C.
share a 700-mile border to the
province's northwest, a strip of
land—the "panhandle"—that has
cut off a number of possible
Canadian outlets to the sea.

B.C. stands to gain when
Alaska becomes a state and the
Jones Shipping Act which limits
coastal shipping between the U.S.
and its territories to American
ships, no longer applied. The act
has given the port of Seattle, 155
miles south of here, a monopoly
of shipping and blocked Cana-
dian ships from carrying freight
from Canadian ports to Alaska.

**Switzerland One Of Canada's
Leading Customers Overseas**

EDMONTON (CP) — Bruce I.
Rankin, commercial counsellor
for Canada at Berne, says Switzer-
land, despite its size, is one of
Canada's best overseas custom-
ers. Canadian manufacturers are
not taking advantage of the op-
portunity.

Mr. Rankin, a graduate of the
University of Alberta in 1941,
visited Edmonton on a cross-Can-
ada tour to meet Canadian busi-
nessmen who have export and
import business with Switzerland.

In many ways, he said in an
interview, Switzerland might
seem like a paradise to exporters
harassed by the maze of currency
and import controls set up by
other countries.

Switzerland was almost wide
open for exporters. It had almost
no import restrictions and no cur-
rency controls.

But the country's healthy econ-
omic position also provided a
catch for would-be exporters. The
plentiful supply of foreign cur-
rencies enabled the Swiss to be
"very exacting customers" who
seek the best goods at the best
price.

NOT BEING EXPLOITED
So far Canadian exporters have
not exploited the market to the
full, Mr. Rankin said, adding that
"It takes some selling. It's a
small market but a very choice
one."

Some Canadian manufacturers
had shied away from lucrative
contracts only because of fear of

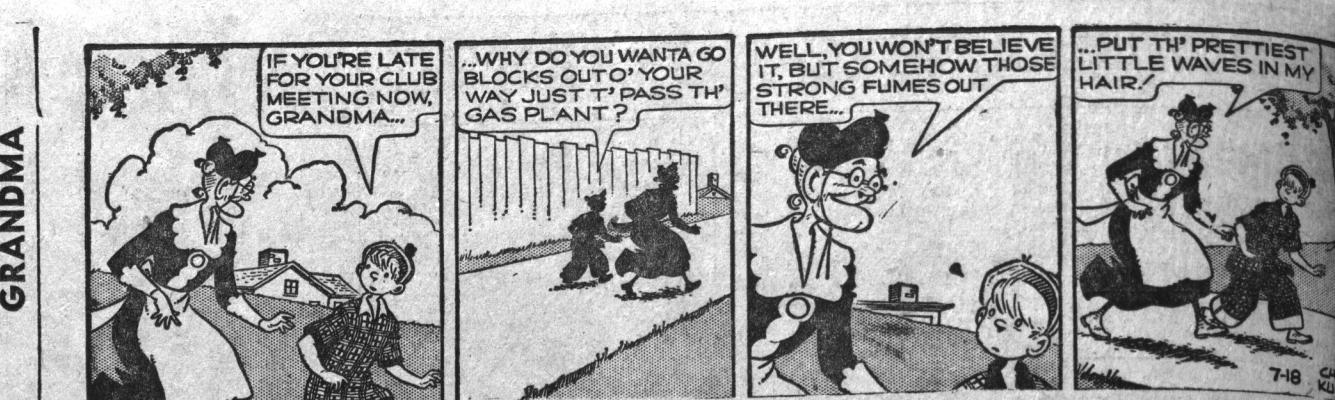
