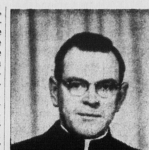

# Graduating Class Is Urged To Enrich Life

"Richly endowed with nature, carefully trained, worthy, motivated and possessed of the vigour, the enthusiasm and the generosity of youth, you are able, and expected to have a distinct scope on a rich and fulfilling life in the community in which, in the future, you will form a part of the graduating class at St. Dunstan's University was held yesterday afternoon in the presence of Rev. Dr. J.P.E. O'Hanley, St. Paul's Parish, Summerside.

Dr. O'Hanley addressed the 62 graduates on the role of the layman in the church, and as a Christian in society.

He stressed the role of the layman in the church has not been spelled out so clearly as that of the priest, but that the priest should entrust the layman with tasks he can perform as well or better than the priest, and allow him to act freely and exercise his responsibility within the limits set for his work or demanded by the common welfare of the Church."

He told the graduates that probably most of them would exercise their apostolate at the parish level which is actually "the church in miniature," because whatever is going on in the Church is also going on in the parish.

**LAYMAN'S ROLE**

Speaking of the layman's role as a Christian in society, Dr. O'Hanley told the graduates that they should not try to disassociate themselves from either their real professional milieu, but should be "in that milieu, a true Christian, and ever striving to be a better one, first, by your constant explication of fraternal char-

ity within the household of the faith; and second, by the expression of this same Christian love towards those with whom you hope to share the God-given gift of faith in Christ-present-in-the-world.

Such, in a word, is the layman's role in the secular sphere of human living; a role by which his Christian life becomes a reality in and through his human life, not in addition to it, but in its very essence.

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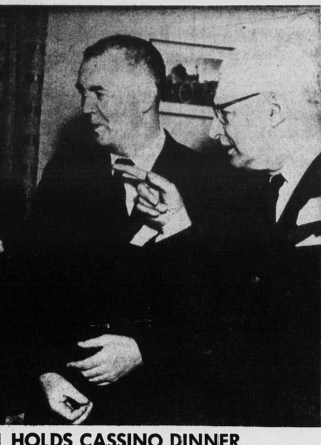
## Deanery AYPA Annual Reveals Record Year

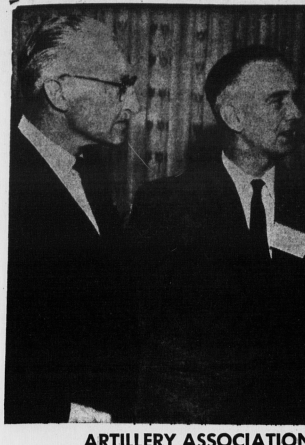

(Continued from page one) ing methods could easily upset the balance of nature. "When you lose your topsoil, your crop yield goes down. Good farm practices can increase the yield and thus improve the economic condition of all your people."

He noted the many new uses for topsoil and said that they should be cleared almost immediately and planted to spruce or other trees. "After all farm produce is not your only good crop."

Better use of the land was also strongly recommended as all land should be put to use. A farmer found his best suited for forestry then it should be put to lumber use. If it were not for specific crops then it should be used as its destiny.

**WASTED LAND**

Mr. Tucker said there was too much land bottom land growing up in useless willows. "It should be reclaimed to provide extremely valuable pastureland that is so vitally needed for our dairy production is to be brought up to the way farmers desire."

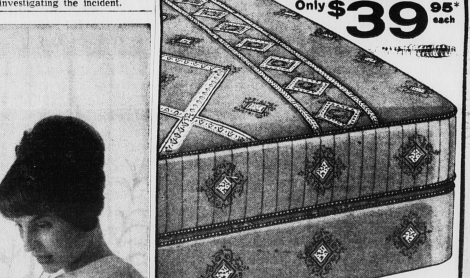
