

were registered, on account of the slow means of travelling, and there were many which had never yet been registered.

Mr. Ferguson said that Deeds taken from the Land Office, were not, as a rule, recorded in the Registry Office.

Mr. Perry saw no difficulty in establishing these offices. Such a measure had been very nearly passed in 1876, and in 1878 a much stronger resolution than the present one was carried by a large majority.

Mr. McLeod said that for the years previous to 1873, there were ninety volumes of deeds alone, and he knew not how many of these should be overhauled, and copies made and entered in separate books.

Mr. Bentley thought the difficulties mentioned by Mr. McLeod not insurmountable; we should study the interests of the people in general.

Mr. John McLean was a member of the special committee, and having found that the Prince County members were very anxious for a Registry Office in Summerside, he had signed the Report, not wishing to thwart their object.
