## CONTRACT BRIDGE

when it was played in the recent Maryland State championships. I was fortunate enough to be a member of the winning team and held the South cards. I was playing with my brother, Simon Becker, of Philadelphia. We optimistically reached a slam and were extremely lucky to be favored with the opening lead of the ace of clubs. Twelve tricks could not now be stopped. With a trump lead we would have been defeated. The score came to 1,430 points (500 for game, 750 for slam, 180 for tricks). Naturally, we assumed we had won the board easily.

But there were strange goings on at the other table also. Our teammates, Julian Adler, Jr., and Mrs. Betty Goldberg, both of Baltimore, held the East-West cards. There the bidding proceeded in a manner too gruesome to record.

South opened with a spade. This bid was vigorously contested until South reached four spades. For reasons unknown, West decided to double. South redoubled. The upshot was that South made five spades, the opening lead being the king of hearts. The trump switch which came later held declarer to eleven tricks. Of course, my teammates assumed the board was irretrievably lost.

Declarer scored 480 points for tricks, 50 for making the redoubled contract, 400 for an over-trick, and 500 for game. Total—1,430 points.

So we halved the board.

**Opening lead—ace of clubs.**  
 The great majority of team of four championships played in this country are decided by what is known as board-a-match scoring. What this means is that each board, or deal, constitutes a match by itself. You either win the board from the opposing team, or lose it, or tie (halve) it. The margin of victory or loss is immaterial. To win a board by 10 points is just as decisive as winning it by 2,000 points. The team which wins the most boards (matches) is the winner of the tournament.

## Bluebloods' Book Stresses Feuding

LONDON (Reuters) — Scotland's traditional Lowlander-Highlander fustyn' and feudin' flared today in the pages of the 1959 edition of DeBrett's Peerage, a who's who of Britain's bluebloods.

The new edition carries a letter from a highland noblewoman who told DeBrett's editor Cyril Hankinson that she would rather be left out of his book than be mentioned on the same page with a mere Lowlander.

The woman said it was "a matter of pride." Hankinson, unable to fulfil her request, said "I am anxiously awaiting the comments of the Lowland branch when they find themselves in close proximity to the Highlanders."

The book's preface reprints several other letters from listees and readers, plus the 63-year-old editor's replies.

In one letter, a well-born lady, apparently disapproving of her daughter-in-law, protested against details of her son's marriage being published.

Hankinson's reply was short: The son was a churchman — so what would be the reaction of members of his flock who looked him up in DeBrett's and found he apparently was single?

Hankinson complains in the preface about abbreviated titles. An Indian knight, for example, mailed in his biographical notes, including a reference to himself as "grand master of USFIC."

Researchers at DeBrett's scratched their heads before finally finding out the meaning: "United Scottish Freemasons of India and Ceylon."

Strange requests are no novelty at the DeBrett's office. Every year a Canadian brigadier—not identified—writes in seeking a list of women-suitable as brides.

Hankinson says he is still intrigued by the telephone caller who asked him to supply a house-keeper for a knight.

"Or was it for a night?" he asks.
