## Morning Coffee Parties Are Popular In Texas

"Morning coffees are a popular form of entertaining in Texas," remarked Miss Orene McClellan, Home Demonstration Agent for Dallas County. "They are held any time between 10 and 11:30, often to welcome new neighbors, or as the social part of a club meeting."

"Up to 11 o'clock, refreshments consist of hot breads or a fine cake, with a choice of coffee or tea. After 11, brunch often is served."

"In my work as Home Demonstration Agent, I find Texas women greatly interested in learning to make fine yeast breads."

"They would love brioche," I suggested; "that delightful French roll perfect to serve at a morning coffee party."

All measurements are level. Brioche: Scald 1/2 c. milk. Cool to lukewarm. Cream 1/2 c. butter or margarine. Gradually add 1-3 c. sugar and 1/2 tsp. salt.

Measure 1/4 c. warm water (not hot) into large mixing bowl. Sprinkle or crumble in 1 pkg. active dry or 1 cake compressed yeast. Stir until dissolved. Stir in milk mixture.

Separate 1 egg, putting white into one small bowl, yolk in another. Set aside egg white. To egg yolk add 3 whole eggs; beat and add to yeast mixture. Beat in 3/4 c. sifted enriched flour. Cover.

Let rise in warm place, free from draft, about 2 hrs., or until doubled in size. Stir down. Beat thoroughly. Snug-cover with aluminum foil. Refrigerate overnight. Stir down; turn out soft dough on floured surface.

Divide in 2 pieces, one about 1/2 weight of dough and other 1/4 the weight. Out smaller piece into 16 equal parts. Form into small balls. Place in well-oiled muffin pans 2 1/2" x 1 1/4".

Cut smaller piece into 16 equal pieces. Form into small balls. Make deep indentation in center of each large ball; dampen slightly with cold water. Press small ball into each indentation. Cover.

Let rise 1 hr. in warm place, free from draft, or until doubled in size.

Mix reserved egg white with 1 tsp. sugar; brush over rolls. Bake 20 min. in mod. oven, 375 degrees F.

Eggs Benedict: Use home-made or ready-to-use Hollandaise sauce, or prepare the following sauce alternate:

Melt 2 tbsp. butter or margarine. Stir in 3 tbsp. flour, 1/4 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. pepper, then gradually 1 1/4 c. milk.

Cook-stir until thick. Add 1 tsp. lemon juice and 1/4 c. mayonnaise. Keep hot over boiling water.

Poach 6 eggs; meantime sauté 6 well-trimmed thin slices of cooked smoked ham.

To assemble: Place ham on toasted split English muffins; arrange on platter. Top each with poached egg.

Spoon over sauce. Top with slice of ripe olive. **CHEF POACHES EGGS**

Add few drops vinegar to poaching water, cover with lid or aluminum foil, steam-poach eggs 4 min.
