Russians Admit Swedish Diplomat Died In Prison

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP)—The Soviet government cleared up a major mystery Thursday by acknowledging that missing Swedish diplomat Raoul Wallenberg died in Moscow 10 years ago.

government said Wallenberg died "suddenly in the night in his cell" (in Lyubanka Prison which houses Soviet police headquarters).
