MAGISTRATE'S COURT—In Magistrate Gaudet's Court yesterday five speeders were fined \$10 and costs or ten days in jail. There were three convictions under the Temperance Act with resultant fines of \$20, \$20 and \$25. A Queen's County man found guilty of insurance fraud was given a two year suspended sentence for this offence.

Life Guard Service At Bathing Area Victoria Park

As the result of a recommendation from the Charlottetown Red Cross Swimming and Water Safety Committee, headed by Mr. Ian Rankine, the City Council at a recent meeting, agreed to subsidize a qualified Life Guard at the Public Bathing House area in Victoria Park where two new floats have just been placed by the Centennial Committee in preparation for the summer season on August 3rd.

The Charlottetown Red Cross Swimming and Water Safety Committee has now completed arrangements to have Mr. Angus MacLaren on duty as Life Guard in this area three hours before and the three hours after the high tide period between 9 in the morning and 8 in the evening every day of the week, with Mr. Don Matthews as his relief after 6 p.m. and on week-ends. Mr. MacLaren who is the Supervisor of the Red Cross Swimming and Water Safety classes being carried on from the Red Cross bathing house area and in the Kiwanis Pool will also give courses of instruction for seniors, intermediates and life savers in the public bathing area during the high tide periods while on duty as life guard.

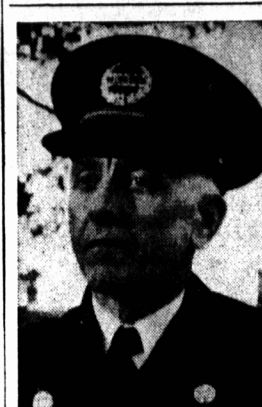

Bulgian urged the eventual withdrawal of all foreign forces from European countries, and said that Russian troops withdrawn from Austria following the treaty restoring Austrian sovereignty are being demobilized. He recommended that the United States, Britain and France do the same with their former garrisons.

Fire Chiefs Arriving For 41st Annual Conference

Members of the Maritime Fire Chiefs' Association, accompanied by their wives, began to arrive in Charlottetown early yesterday morning and by evening more than one hundred registrations were recorded, to attend the 41st. annual conference which opens officially at ten o'clock this morning.

Deputy Chief G. H. Brundige of Halifax, secretary of the Association, said last evening that the advance registrations were being picked up rapidly and he expected the convention to be one of the largest in the 41 years of the life of the Association. Mrs. Edna de Sanctus convention secretary, formerly of Charlottetown but now a resident of Halifax, is associated with Deputy Chief Brundige in making the registrations and as-

and the Warsaw treaty while the groupings of states created on the basis of the arrangements would be abolished and replaced by an all-European system of collective security.

BRINGS IN FAR EAST

Bulgian also brought in Far Eastern problems, something the West had been anxious to avoid discussing at this meeting. He said the situation in the Far East would be eased if Communist China's "undisputable right" to Formosa were recognized.

The conference should also note the importance of admitting Communist China to the United Nations, he said.

On atomic energy, Bulgian announced that his government has decided to contribute to the international pool of atomic materials of the international atomic energy agency an appropriate amount of fissible materials as soon as agreement is setting up this agency has been reached.

SURPRISE ACCEPTANCE

He disclosed this surprise acceptance of Eisenhower's "atoms-for-peace" plan only a few hours after the president had expressed disappointment in his speech over Russian failure to participate in the plan, which he originated two years ago. The atomic materials would be used for peaceful atomic energy development.

After jovial banquets Monday morning, the four leaders and their advisers settled down in the conference room. Outside the temperature climbed toward 90 degrees.

Eisenhower, as seniors statesman present, was in the chair. The president set the note for the frank exchange of views, saying he hoped the four powers had gathered, not to catalogue their differences, but to start diplomacy in a new spirit "in response to the peaceful aspirations of mankind."

He said the meeting could not expect in the short time as its dispositive—he plans to return to Washington next weekend—to solve all the world's problems, but it might be able to take "the first steps on a new road to a just and durable peace."

The ferry "Fairview" came off the slip at Pictou and returned to Charlottetown yesterday after an absence of seven weeks during which time a major overhaul took place. It is said that the ship is now in good condition and expectations indicate a resumption of the ferry service between the city and Rocky Point will be inaugurated this morning.

"I strongly favour the fire services learn what to do and how to act."

Chief Burnett who is president of the International Fire Chiefs' Association went on to describe the courses being held by Fire Departments in many areas of the United States where recognition of the need of such co-operation is outstanding as a defence measure.

"The fire fighting men have been recognized as an emergency organization qualified to be competent to do special work in their field in the protection of life and property, a work they gladly do when called upon anywhere and everywhere," Chief Burnett said.

Cardinal's Release Not End Of Moral Oppression

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican indicated Monday that Communist Hungary's release of Joseph Cardinal Mindszenty from prison failed to recognize his innocence and means no end to spiritual and moral oppression of Hungary's Roman Catholic faithful.

L'Osservatore Romano, published in the Vatican and reflecting Vatican views, devoted its leading column to an editorial on cardinal Mindszenty.

Cardinal Mindszenty, primate of Hungary, was arrested by Communist police Dec. 23, 1949. Despite protests from many lands, he was sentenced the following February to prison for "espionage, high treason and illegal financial transactions."

The Vatican has repeatedly said the trial was a farce and the evidence was forged.

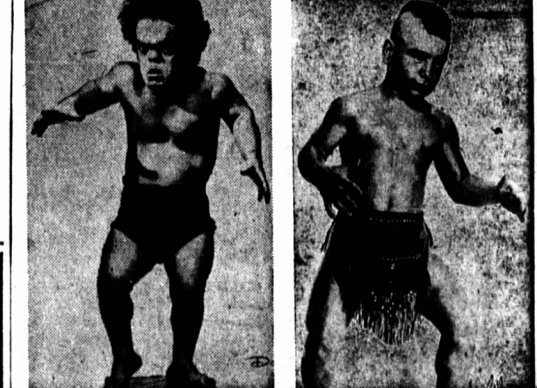
