DR. BUCHANAN'S TRIAL.

The Accused on the Witness Stand.

NEW YORK, April 20. Edwin Booth, the actor, has been stricken with paralysis, and is not expected to live. On the trial of Dr. Buchanan for wife poisoning, yesterday, the accused testified on his own behalf. He said that he never gave his wife morphine or antrophia, and never prescribed for her after their marriage. He stated that he was her physician before their marriage. On cross-examination, Dr. Buchanan said that he saw Mrs. Sutherland about six times before he married her, and declared that he loved her at that time and up to the time of her death. He denied knowledge that she was keeper of a disorderly house when he met her. His testimony contained nothing of special importance, except that it was a complete contradiction of the criminal accusation against him.

A Liberal Defection.

LONDON, April 20. The chief subject of interest in the House of Commons is the avowed defection from the Liberal party, so far as Irish Home Rule is concerned, of Wm. Saunders, M. P. for Newington, Watworth. Mr. Saunders has announced his opposition to the Home Rule Bill based on the requirement of a property qualification for the second chamber of Irish Parliament.

Montreal Matters.

MONTREAL, April 20. Hon. Mr. Foster has intimated to the Board of Trade here that he would like to discuss tariff matters with representatives of the different trades in Montreal.

While Patrick Haley, aged 60, was watching over the corpse of his wife, who died yesterday, the drapery around the coffin caught fire from the candles, and in his efforts to save the corpse Haley was smothered, and when found by the firemen was burned to death.
