Mrs D MacIntosh Leader in Women's Organizations, Dies

Mrs. D. H. MacIntosh, 56, well-known in Winnipeg women's organizations, died suddenly at her home, 527 Camden Place, Winnipeg, Man.

Born in Granville, P. E. I., she was the daughter of George and Ethel Morrison. In 1918 she married Edward MacIntosh. They resided in the east until 1920 when they moved to Alberta, first to Edmonton and later Red Deer.

Mr. and Mrs. MacIntosh came to Winnipeg in 1936, residing here since, with the exception of one year in Flin Flon.

Mrs. MacIntosh was actively interested in the Home Welfare Association, serving nine years as treasurer and for many years in other posts.

During the Second World War she helped organize the women's auxiliary of the Parachute Battalion in the Special Service Force, becoming its first president. She was also on the executive of the women's auxiliary of A3 Artillery School at Shilo.

She served on the executive of women's organizations at Chalmers United Church. For a time she was also executive member of the Isaac Brock Community Club.

She is survived by her husband, Edward MacIntosh, Lieutenant Howard MacIntosh, Rivers; son at home; a daughter, Mrs. William Watson, Winnipeg; three brothers, G. M. Morrison and A. S. Morrison, both of Winnipeg; D. H. Morrison, Moncton, N. B.; two sisters, Mrs. Alan McLean, Moncton; Mrs. D. J. Steves, Framingham, Mass.; two grandchildren, John Howard and Laurie Ellen MacIntosh.
