France Wants Immediate Settlement of Egyptian Affairs.

LONDON, Nov. 4. M. B. deff, French Controller of Egyptian Affairs, has written a letter to the President of the Egyptian Council, stating that he has not been invited to attend the Council of Ministers, and as the European control of Egypt has not been abolished by the Khedive's decree, he wants to know why he has not been invited to the council meeting of the Egyptian Ministers. The letter is regarded in diplomatic circles as manifesting the intention of France to settle the European control of Egypt immediately, without awaiting the general settlement of Egyptian affairs at present proposed by the Government of Great Britain.

France and Switzerland.

PARIS, Nov. 4. The French Minister of Foreign Affairs has addressed a strong note to Switzerland, respecting the proceedings of the Anarchist Association in France, and asking an explanation why they are harbored by the Swiss Government.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, Nov. 2.

In the Commons, this afternoon, Mr. Gladstone said the Government thought a contribution should be demanded from Egypt for the expense of British occupation.

Sir Stafford Northcote asked whether the Government could continue the occupation of Egypt without the authority of Parliament.

Mr. Gladstone declared the occupation was the result of the war. The use of the word "war" by Mr. Gladstone created a general demonstration in the House, as he has hitherto denied England was at war with Egypt.

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.

A match with soft gloves was arranged to-night between Sullivan and Elliott. The former agrees to give Elliott \$500 and the gate receipts if he fails to knock him out of time in four rounds. The match occurs Dec. 9, either in Chicago, Milwaukee or Pittsburg.

MADRID, Nov. 2.

At a Council of Ministers to-day, King Alfonso presiding, it was decided not to hand over the Cuban refugees to the British authorities.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 2.

Steamer Oceanic brings Yokohama dates to Oct. 17th. The Mikado is seriously ill. The cattle plague is alarmingly prevalent in the south-western provinces. Heavy floods in the central provinces have caused great loss of life and property. Small villages were swept away; thousands of persons were reported drowned. There was considerable dissatisfaction with the manner in which the finances of the country are handled by officials. The currency is at a discount of 60 per cent., with no systematic effort to restore it. Several national banks have failed under disgraceful circumstances. Cholera is decreasing. The rice crop is abundant.

Hong Kong advices of Oct. 7 say: The building of arsenals will commence near Kirin. It is supposed that Russian encroachment is apprehended. French officials in Tonquin are said to be organizing a force to drive away the Chinese. Troops have been sent down from Canton for the defence of the American territory. Four Englishmen belonging to the customs service of China, with several Chinese associates, have been sent to Corea to establish customs stations there in the Chinese interest.

PARIS, Nov. 2.

A secret dynamite factory has been discovered at Charolles. Henri Rochefort has gone to Montceau Les Mines. Prisoners are awaiting trial in connexion with the recent riots. Rochefort regards the permanent garrison there as dangerous provocation to further rioting.

LONDON, Nov. 2.

The Times' St. Petersburg correspondent says the great increase of fires in Russia is causing nearly all the insurance companies to fall back on their reserve funds. The insurance premiums have just been raised by 40 per cent. on advice of the delegates from English companies, who were present at the insurance congress recently held here. Geo. Crichton, the celebrated oculist, is dead.

LONDON, Nov. 2.

The general result of the municipal elections which have just been held in England and Wales is a Tory gain.

ALEXANDRIA, Nov. 2.

A telegram from Mecca reports a severe outbreak of cholera there. Baker Pasha, in consequence, has ordered 600 men, equipped, to guard the seaports.

ROME, Nov. 2.

The elections for the Chamber of Deputies last Sunday, resulted in the return of 99 Right, 65 centre, 258 Left, 27 Radicals, and 2 Socialists. The voting throughout the country was orderly, except at Leghorn, where a mob attempted to destroy the urns and registers.

LINGTON, Ky. Nov. 1.

While the troops guarding Neal and Crafts, the Ashland murderers, were on their way to the steamer, to-day, they were attacked by a mob. The soldiers fired and several of the attacking party were killed and wounded. The prisoners and troops got safely on board the steamer when the mob seized a train and headed off the boat at Ashland, Ky., where another attack was made. The troops returned the fire and again a number of the mob were killed and wounded. So far as known only three soldiers were wounded, and they but slightly. Private despatches received in this city place the number of killed at five and of the wounded at thirty. The steamer Granite State has passed Portsmouth, and unless the fog prevents will reach Marysville to-night where the prisoners will be transferred to the railroad to be taken to Lexington.

BOSTON, Nov. 1.

A large audience greeted Christine Nilsson upon her re-appearance in this country, at Music Hall this evening. As she appeared upon the stage, that in black she received

hearty applause, and in her first selection, 'Angela ever Bright and Fair,' gave evidence that her voice has lost none of its old power and brilliancy. She was recalled seven times and led a little child upon the stage with her. The reception to herself and other members of the company was most cordial, and the encores and recalls prolonged the performance until a late hour.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 2.

Lord Dufferin, British ambassador, had an interview with the Sultan to-day. It is rumored that in consequence of the fact that Lord Dufferin is to replace Sir Edward Malet in Egypt, the Porte is considering the advisability of despatching a high commission to Cairo.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.

Patrick Carry, a Longshoreman, this afternoon received a verdict of \$15,000 in a suit against the Cunard Steamship Co., for injuries received by the falling of a coal tub while unloading the steamer Batavia in Nov., 1880.

SUPREME COURT.—The argument in Carlton vs. Lavis has been finished, and the Court reserved judgment. Merchants Bank of Halifax vs. McNutt—Rule for a new trial argued and judgment reserved.

THE foreign mails, via, Shetland arrive very late in the city. On Thursday night they did not reach the Post Office until after midnight, and last night it was a quarter past eleven when they arrived. The delay is owing, it is said, to the heavy freights taken by the boats to and from Point du Chene.

THE attendance at a meeting of a certain literary association last evening being small, one of the members excused the absence of his associates by stating that very few of them saw the daily newspaper in which the advertisement was inserted. This is sarcasm with a vengeance. He who does not read the daily newspaper is truly a literary character, and his non-attendance should be deplored.
