Counter-Proposals May Produce Wider Free Trade

Britain's proposal of an Anglo-Canadian free-trade union may well be countered by a Canadian suggestion of a free-trade union for all the Commonwealth.
At the moment Britain seems to have scored an advantage in what some officials describe as the game of "grand design" for realignment of Canadian trade.
Prime Minister Diefenbaker has suggested that Canada might switch 15 per cent of her imports from the United States to the United Kingdom to reduce Canada's deficit in U.S. trade and to provide the U.K. with more dollars to buy Canadian goods.
So striking was Mr. Diefenbaker's suggestion that Britain lost no time in virtually challenging him to implement the switch by accepting the free-trade union idea.

domination and control of their economies.
That, then, may lead to the shelving of the whole idea of free trade, without causing any serious embarrassment to Canadian officials.
SOME CONCRETE RESULTS
Meanwhile, all the international manoeuvring within the last two weeks—at Mont Tremblant, Que., Ottawa and Washington—has led to at least some concrete results:
1. As Canada desired, a full-scale Commonwealth trade and economic conference will be held next year, likely in Canada.
2. Canada will send a trade mission to Britain and take other steps to encourage U.K. exports to Canada. But at best only a minor increase is likely to ensue.
3. The U.S. has shown no real concern over the possibility of a major realignment of Canada-U.S. trade. However, she has agreed to go easy on her wheat giveaway program, a thorn in Canada's attempts to get rid of her own huge wheat surplus.

LIKELY COMMONS ISSUE

The reaction of Canadian industry was such that the Progressive Conservative administration found it best to make no immediate reply. The proposal was neither accepted nor rejected, though undoubtedly it is being given careful scrutiny in federal trade quarters.
Mr. Diefenbaker will most likely have to face the issue in Parliament which opens next week. The Liberals are understood ready to pounce on him, to demand that his party make clear its stand on that important development.
And undoubtedly Britain may raise the issue again, perhaps at a January meeting in London of Commonwealth officials preparing for the Commonwealth trade and economic conference to be held later next year.

POSSIBLE ALTERNATIVE

Canadian may suggest that, instead of just a two-way tariff strip, the whole Commonwealth agree to a free-trade union. The suggestion of increasing certain tariff preferences is to be taken up at the full conference next year. Why not at the same time consider stripping all tariffs from within the Commonwealth, removing all blocks to the flow of trade within that area?
The likelihood of that being accepted is somewhat remote. Australia, for example, has obtained permission from Britain, under bilateral deal, to eliminate some imperial preferences to promote Australian agreements with the U.S. India and some other Asian powers may feel that elimination of import restrictions may increase the possibility of foreign

Six Senate Vacancies Are Filled By Prime Minister

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Diefenbaker has almost doubled Progressive Conservative party strength in the Senate but the Liberals still hold a heavy numerical superiority.
He named six new senators Saturday, increasing Progressive Conservative membership in the 102-seat upper chamber from seven to 13. The Liberals have 78 members and there are two independents, one Independent Liberal and eight vacancies.
The new senators:
William R. Brunt, 57, Toronto and Hanover, Ont., and Dr. Joseph A. Sullivan, 55 Toronto for Ontario.
Leon Methot 62, Trois-Rivieres, Que., and Gustave Monette, 70, Montreal for Quebec.
Clarence V. Emerson 56, Saint John N.B. for New Brunswick.
Arthur M. Pearson 67, Lumsden, Sask., for Saskatchewan.

STILL TWO VACANCIES

There still are two Senate vacancies in Quebec and one each in New Brunswick, Alberta, Manitoba, Nova Scotia, Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island.
Senators Brunt, Methot and Monette are lawyers, Senator Emerson a retail hardware merchant, Senator Sullivan a physician and surgeon and Senator Pearson a farmer. Except for Senator Pearson, a former mayor of Lumsden, none of the new senators has had previous experience in municipal, provincial or federal government.
