

# Polish 'Government-in-Exile' Continues Meetings In London

LONDON (CP)—Every Friday evening a handful of elderly men congregate in London's smart Belgrave district and sit in ritual dignity for another cabinet meeting of the government of the Republic of Poland.

It's not the "real" government, of course, but a group which sometimes describes

itself as the "legitimate and constitutional government, known as the Polish government-in-exile."

This is the all-but-forgotten fiasco of the Second World War, victims of great-power compromise and the hard realities of post-war politics.

Their fate was decided in 1945. At Yalta, in February, the Western Allies accorded Stalin the right to a "friendly government" in Poland and five months later recognized the puppet Communist regime set up in Warsaw under Russian sponsorship. At the Potsdam conference in August, the Big Three decreed that the "former Polish government in London... no longer exists."

But the government-in-exile refused to vanish. Stripped of all diplomatic recognition, rebuffed or disowned by everyone but fellow exiles, it continues the quiet and comfortless mission of besieging the world's capitals with mimeographed demands for the "restoration of the independence, freedom and sovereignty of the Polish nation."

A hand reported by M. Harrison-Gray in the British Bridge Magazine has unusual points of interest. The deal occurred in a national team of four championship in England many years ago.

South got to five spades doubled and West led the queen of hearts. Declarer won it with the ace and returned a trump.

West, realizing that his partner had to have the two missing aces for his opening bid, once South had shown up with the ace of hearts, went up with the ace of spades and shifted to the

king of diamonds. West was planning to get a diamond ruff in case his partner had three or four diamonds to the ace.

But alas, East, who made the normal assumption that his partner had a number of diamonds headed by the K-Q, overlooked the king of diamonds with the ace and returned a diamond, expecting to get a ruff on the third round of the suit.

But things didn't work out quite that way, due to the circumstances, and South father incredibly wound up making five spades doubled.

The late S. J. Simon, author of the best-seller, Why You Lose at Bridge, reported the hand sympathetically in The Observer, saying a moag other things: "East's play, though ill-judged, wasn't nearly as crazy as it looks. I've done more stupid things than that in my time. Much."

allowed to remain entirely aloof.

For example, when one of the wartime Polish heroes died here recently, there were outraged protests from the U.K.'s 80,000 Poles because Britain failed to send a representative to the funeral.

Mumbling that it had been misunderstood, the British government announced it would send official representatives to a later memorial service. In the end, the government-in-exile boycotted the memorial service because its members were not given pride of place among the mourners.

**WANTS NEUTRAL ZONE**  
At best, the government-in-exile can only hope to avoid slighted and to seek a sympathetic, unofficial hearing from Western governments as the representative of the thousands of Poles living in the West and as the possible nucleus of some future non-Communist government in Poland.

Its tenuous legality is maintained by following to the letter a 1983 Polish constitution which made provision for government continuity during wartime or exile.

Inevitably after so many years, there are bitter divisions among the Poles in exile. Apart from routine political differences, there are what one exile has called "intrigues of people with time on their hands and personal ambitions" — intrigues which undermine the authority of the government-in-exile among its fellow emigres.
