A Magnificent Struggle.

ROSS LOSES BY A FOUL.

Laycock Challenges Hanlan.

Special despatch to Examiner.

LONDON, Nov. 21.

For the final contest of the regatta there was dry weather with a tinge of frost. There was a noticeable improvement in the attendance over preceding days. When the umpire, Mr. Ireland, gave the word "go," Ross clipped water instantly, and lifted his skiff to the fore, Hosmer getting way on his boat quicker than Laycock, while Warren Smith's position gave him a pull over the Australian. A few strokes had drawn Ross clear, and Smith, too, had got far enough to bring Laycock into his wash, and Hosmer rowing level. As they passed Simmond's Yard, before both boat houses had been cleared, Laycock had drawn up to Smith, and Hosmer on Ross. Ross then quickened his stroke, but Hosmer stuck to him, and Laycock was steadily holding his man, but was yet third in the race, while Smith was quite done already. At this point Ross, Hosmer and Laycock were rowing

A MAGNIFICENT RACE.

Yet despite Ross' seeming ability to spurt away as Hosmer and Laycock closed on him, the Australian has plenty of supporters at even money. Ross here had a length lead, with Laycock fairly in his wash and Hosmer holding a slight advantage as second. Ross breasted the soap works in nine minutes, but was here

OVERLAPPED BY HOSMER

on one side and Laycock on the other. The shouting this time on the Tow path and aloft was deafening. As the men closed a foul was barely prevented. Ross having Hosmer up to the stern of his skiff on the Surrey side and Laycock towards midstream, a stroke or two took the New Brunswick out of danger; and Laycock steering indifferently, lost a little, and Hosmer then shot his boat clear into second place, Smith being upwards of 100 yards astern.

ROSS LED BY A LENGTH

at Hammersmith Bridge, which was reached in 10 min. and 50 seconds, Laycock and Hosmer being level off the Dover. Ross who had just spurted, and came back to Laycock and it was evident that the pace was telling on him, while Hosmer here was second and overlapping Ross' skiff. The foot of Chewick was reached in 14 min. and 31 seconds. A grand race followed round the bend. The Australian was evidently making it

A WAITING RACE,

and off the Water Works got the nose of his skiff level with Ross. The latter quickened pace, and the heads of their boats were looking in towards Middlesex shore—Laycock being in his own water—the upshot being that a slight foul ensued, which Ross claimed, and for a stroke or two afterwards they had

THEIR SKULLS OVERLAPPING.

Hosmer failed to keep his boat straight while this by play was going on, but perhaps had a lead by a shade when the others got clear. Laycock, however, was full of rowing, and quickened up and left his man, fast improving his advantage at every stroke. Hosmer dropped a length astern of Ross. From this the

RACE WAS OVER.

Laycock coming in ahead by about seven lengths, Ross second, Hosmer a good third, and Smith distanced. Time 26m. 46s. Ross formally claimed a foul, but it was disallowed, and he then challenged Laycock for a match for £200 a side.

LAYCOCK CHALLENGES HANLAN.

The Sportsman has the following, "Laycock in his challenge to Hanlan says, that he must soon return to Sydney and therefore hopes Hanlan will afford him an opportunity of ascertaining who is the best sculler in the world.

THE BETTING.

Ross was the favorite, Laycock and Smith were looked upon as pretty evenly matched, while many were putting up money on Hosmer against Smith.
