## Liberal Obstructionists Assailed Before Overflow Through in S'side

Fired up by an overflow gathering of nearly 1,100 people who jammed the Capitol Theatre in Summerside yesterday morning, Prime Minister Diefenbaker blasted the obstruction tactics of the Liberal party during the last session of parliament and told his cheering audience "these meetings outside all I have ever attended at this time of the morning."

The meeting, which was presided over by William Armett, was devoid of hecklers and nearly every square foot of space in the main part of the theatre as well as the balcony, sides and lobby were jammed for when the prime minister who was accompanied by his wife.

He was introduced by federal Prince County candidate, G. Lorne Monkley, who was introduced by Senator Orville H. Phillips.

Chiding the Liberals at every turn, the Prime Minister said "I have come across the country these days and I am feeling, they don't build halls large enough for the needs of people who want to hear the truth."

Referring to the last session of parliament he said "we will answer the type of attack which no prime minister has ever before been subjected in the history of Canada. I was denied the right to speak in parliament." He added that during the opening day of parliament, he denied us the opportunity to pass legislation, except in a few minor cases.

"The Liberals hoped they would be able to force us out of office before the end of the session last May and June could be expected." At that time, he stated the Liberals tried to be hand-cuffed and "that I deceived the Canadian people."
