Local and Other Items.

ST. PETERS TEA.—The date of the tea to be held at St. Peter's Bay has been changed from the 16th inst., until Monday the 21st inst.

AT SANTIAGO.—The schooner B. C. Borden, Taylor master, arrived in Santiago on the 16th, seven days from Demarara to load lumber for New York. All well.

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.—It is reported that an emergency meeting of the Executive Council is being held this afternoon. The Farquharson Government is in dire distress.

FLAPPER SHOOTING ON SUNDAY.—We have received a strong and emphatic complaint from Flat River against certain sportsmen from Charlottetown who, it is charged, came to that settlement a few days ago, and not only violated the law relating to duck shooting, but actually fired at birds on the Sabbath day.

THE BONAVISTA.—As the town clock was striking ten last night, the Bonavista was being docked at her wharf. She brought a large inward freight and had a full list of passengers most of whom were making the round trip. She sailed shortly after eleven this morning, taking one outward passenger, Mr. Reuben McDonald, of Georgetown who intended making the round trip. The outward cargo consisted of 700 bags of oats, 300 pkgs of butter, 15 head of cattle, 132 sheep several horses and a number of sundries.

ABOUT THE WHARVES.—The schooner Stanley Mac arrived from New York yesterday afternoon with hard coal; the schooner Dayspring from Marble Mountain with lime stone, the Evening Star with coal from Sidney, all arrived yesterday afternoon and the schooner Jessen with round coal from New Campbellton arrived this morning, all for Messrs C. Lyons & Co.

ACCOMMODATION.—The sidewalk on Water Street between Cumberland and Hilleborough was this morning taken up to allow the sewerage trenches to be dug. There is no side walk on the other side of the street, and in view of the large number of people who have, of necessity, to walk to and from the station it has been suggested as a convenience to those having to do so, that the sidewalk be laid along the side of the street, and also that the work be finished here as fast as possible. Other wise numbers of persons will have to walk in the middle of a dusty or muddy street. At this time of the year especially when strangers are about, this should not be.

ANOTHER YACHT.—As a thing of beauty in the sailing line, and a joy, at least for a time, the handsome American pleasure yacht, Sentinel, of Chicago, which arrived yesterday afternoon and sailed this morning at seven, probably leads anything that has ever entered Charlottetown harbor—she's so trim, so neat and so spotlessly clean. Everything about her is got up in the costliest manner. She is lighted with electricity, has a powerful searchlight, all the woodwork is of mahogany and the fittings of brass, and her naphtha launch and small sized can-oo came in for a little share of attention from the number who had the pleasure of seeing her as she lay at Poole & Lewis' Wharf. Her length is 124 feet and she maintains a cruising speed of 10 knots. Her owner is Mr. Billings, who is now in Boston, and two friends of his on board. While at the wharf she was supplied with water, with ten tons of egg anthracite coal by C. Lyon & Co., and with a quantity of fresh provisions by Blake Bros. From here she goes to Halifax, then to Boston, where she will be joined by her owner and then will attend the great international yacht race between the Swanrock and the Columbia.

Local and Other Items.

I O O F.—Wildly Lodge meets to-night at 8 o'clock.

THE PROBS.—Moderate winds, generally fine, a few scattered thunder showers, not much change in temperature.

THE GHENT.—The City of Ghent arrived yesterday afternoon at about five o'clock. She had three inward passengers, and a fair cargo both ways.

POLICE COURT.—The police court was not held this morning. Four drunks were arrested yesterday. All were allowed bail and will come up for trial to-morrow morning.

MORZ SPRINGS.—While excavating for the reservoir near the Gas Works, Wednesday night a spring was tapped with the result that seven feet of water has flowed into the excavation.

THE ELECTRA.—The Electra, due Wednesday night, did not arrive until yesterday afternoon. She had a full cargo inward and outward, and had again to leave a quantity of that offering outward, mostly self-binders on the wharf. She sailed at five this morning.

THE EVELYN.—The three-masted schr. Evelyn, arrived here this morning at seven o'clock. She is in charge of Captain Howell and the run from Barbadoes was made in sixteen days. Her cargo consists of molasses and sugar for Messrs. Rattenbury and Toombs. Captain Benoit, who while in Barbadoes had a paralytic stroke, is coming home by the S. S. Duart Castle.

SALMON FOR LONDON.—Among the shipments to London by the Furness liner Halifax City, which sailed from this port on Friday, was a carload of frozen salmon. They were loaded at Chatham, N. B., in cold storage car 9521, and were received at the ship's gangway in splendid condition. The interior of the car presented quite a frigid appearance, the walls and floor being decorated with hoar frost. The contents of the car were transferred to the steamer's cold storage apartment in good shape, and with a prospect of arriving in London in prime condition. Some of the railway men who inspected the cold storage facilities on board the steamer say that the temperature was like the Klondike in midwinter.

THE CAMPANA.—The Campana arrived here this morning at five o'clock and left for Souris and Pictou at twelve o'clock noon. She brought a full cargo, a large quantity of which was flour and meal, and on leaving Quebec had one hundred and twenty-five passengers. ANOTHER BURGLARY.—Yesterday morning between three and four o'clock—just about the same time as the attempt at burglary was made at Mr. J. A. McKinley's, North River, on the previous morning—burglars entered the forge of Messrs. Batt Bros., at the head of Poole & Lewis' wharf. They broke in through the window in the end of the building tearing the shutter off. A lot of spare brass and copper which was about the shop—worth at least \$10 or \$12 was taken, and shortly afterwards sold to Simon a foreigner who buys junk and keeps a store on the corner of Pownal and King streets. The matter has not been reported to the police and the burglars have since disappeared. It is reported that a quantity of copper was also stolen out of the warehouse used by Mr. White, the contractor who is building the S S Brant.
