Pressure from Sask. The official disclosed that Canada's effort to trim the insurance rates resulted from strong pressure from Saskatchewan shippers who want to move grain and other commodities to the U.K. through Churchill.

Otherwise, they face comparatively higher freight costs in moving their goods by truck and rail to lake-head points or west-coast ports. The people most interested in securing lower rates at Churchill are those engaged in the wheat industry.

Newfoundland Men

Seek Furtherance Of Mutual Trade

The people of Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland should patronize and foster trade as much as possible with one another, stated Mr. W. R. Goobie, Vice President of the Purity Biscuit Company, St. John's, Newfoundland, in an interview last night. Mr. Goobie was speaking of a greater reciprocity of trade between the two provinces.

Mr. Goobie and Mr. H. A. Burke, sales manager of the Company, are in the Province to survey the potential market for their biscuits and lines of confectionery. Yesterday they met with Premier Jones and members of the Government and today they will visit Summerside and other Island centres.

Mr. Goobie believes that a large volume of trade could be built up between the two Island Provinces if present trading relations were more equalized. "This Province, he said, could import Newfoundland paints and cordage such as ropes, fishing twines and nets."

The "Eskimo", he stated, could easily operate at a substantial profit if he carried a paying load both ways. He suggested that fish could be carried back here if the boat had proper refrigeration accommodations.

The people of Newfoundland are desirous of a more mutually advantageous trade, he stated. It is not the fault of the P. E. Island people that the trade is not more reciprocal, but of the Newfoundlanders themselves as they have hardly attempted to open up markets here.

The visitors were well received in their contacts yesterday and were encouraged by the Government to proceed with their enterprise, he stated. They hope to have their products on the Island market within two months.

A Dominion-wide appeal for equipment for dike workers at Winnipeg, has been launched by the Canadian Red Cross Society and its National Commissioner, Dr. W. S. Stanbury, who has just returned to Toronto from the flood devastated area.

In the wire received by the Prince Edward Island Red Cross, Dr. Stanbury stated that rubber waders, heavy socks and gloves were urgently needed for the use of the dike workers.

Since the flood is now at its peak, speed is necessarily essential in the collection of these needed articles. Donations of the articles mentioned should be sent forward to Provincial Red Cross Headquarters in Charlottetown today so that they may be forwarded immediately in order to be of the utmost use.

More Livestock Entries

"We had more entries for our live stock show than in the previous year and as usual the quality was up to standard. The increase in numbers is no doubt due to the amount offered by our Association in prizes, which is excelled by only one province in the Dominion for Class A shows. I might mention here that this Association offers upwards of \$50,000. Our exhibit of poultry was on a par with other years and some very fine specimens shown. Our sheep breeders also made a greater contribution to the show than in previous years. I am pleased to report that our government is taking much more interest in promoting the improvement of this line of live stock. The entry list in the horse class was about the same as last year and the judges made very favorable comments on the "type" of each class. Entries for hogs showed a great improvement over the previous years with an increase of 180 percent over 1947 and the judges claimed that the hogs exhibited were the best we had ever seen in Canada and we think he was justified in saying this as some of the hogs exhibited here were later shown at the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto and topped the dressed carcass class. The percentage of select hogs is higher here than in any other province in the Dominion.

Improvements "All the necessary repairs were taken care of at the plant as usual and two new barns built; one for poultry and one for race horses and part of the race track was resurfaced. "The vaudeville was of a high order and some spectacular performances were put on in front of the grand stand and furnished thrills and laughter for the large crowds; notable among the acts being Athos, the one-finger balancing wonder; Snookums, the Wonder bear and the Kirk Adams Circus. "The fox pavilion was renovated and remodelled inside as suggested by the Women's Institute, who donated their time and talent to the long felt need since the old building was burned some years ago. The comments heard from the general public on the showing of handicraft, home cooking and floral display were such that the directors have decided to increase the space available for this department in the very near future. "The Fox Show was held as usual in November and due to the low price of fox pelts the entries were not so numerous as in the past but the large milk entry made up for the deficiency in the fox entries and I think more interest was created in the milk show than for the past number of years.
