Short Answers.

The Guardian finds itself without a case for the Scott Act, and forthwith abuses THE EXAMINER because THE EXAMINER, in the mildest language, set forth a few reasons why the Scott Act should not be upheld.

The Rev. Job Shenton maintains that the Scott Act has very materially lessened drunkenness, and that when men resort to low dives to get bad liquor their moral sense is blunted.
