Rev. J.J. Dunphy of Morell Rear, who was ordained Saturday to the Holy Priesthood by Most Rev. M.A. MacEachern, Bishop of Charlottetown celebrated his first Solemn Mass in his native parish of St. Lawrence O'Toole yesterday at 10:30 p.m.

He was assisted by Rev. Reginald Phelan an Assistant priest, Rev. Frank Aylward, Deacon, Rev. Floyd McLaugh, Sub-deacon, and Rev. Eric Robin, Master of Ceremonies.

An eloquent sermon on the Priesthood was delivered by Rev. Phelan McKenna of Alberton, a former pastor of St. Lawrence Parish.

Expect Record 181 Candidates In Manitoba

WINNIPEG (CP)—A record 181 candidates are expected to be nominated today to contest the 57 seats in the Manitoba legislature in a general election June 16.

Nominations close at 2 p.m. CDT.

The number of candidates already named is well above the 168 who competed in the last general election in 1953.

As the nomination deadline approached, the Liberal - Progressive government supporters and Progressive Conservatives each had nominated candidates in all but one riding. In the Winnipeg city constituency of Logan, Mayor Stephen Juba of Winnipeg, seeking re-election as an independent, appeared likely to be opposed by the CCF.

The CCF party had nominated 44 candidates and the Social Credit party 15. In addition to Mr. Juba there were five independent candidates and three others, including two independent Conservatives and a Labor-Progressive (Communist) party candidate.

The 1953 election was contested by 47 Liberal-Progressives, 42 Social Credit candidates, 38 Progressive Conservatives, 25 CCF, 15 independents and the same lone Labor - Progressive candidate.
