BOSTON, Mar. 7—(AP)—Three Brink's Money Express Company employees in the firm's office when it was robbed of \$121,000 on Jan. 17, 1950, refused to submit to a lie-detector test today.

Reports of the questioning were given to Attorney-General Francis Kelly.

This action, however, was described as routine by police, who withheld identities of the three.

The Brink's robbery was the biggest cash hold-up in the history of the United States.
