

IV. Find the sum of 3, 15, 75, &c. to 20 terms. Ans. 71, 525, 573, 730, 468.

V. Find the present worth of \$300 due in 3 years, 4 months, 25 days, at 6 per cent, allowing 8 per cent discount. Ans. \$283.95.

VI. The price of a certain lot of goods is \$80 per yd, buy at 10 per cent off, and sell at 25 per cent on, what per cent do I gain? Ans 38 8/9%.

VII. If 50 men dig a ditch 200 feet long, 6 feet wide, 4 feet deep, in 10 days of 9 hours each, find the length of the ditch that can be dug by 75 men, in 20 days of 7 hours each, if it can be 8 feet wide and three feet deep? Ans. 533 1/3 feet.

VIII. Find the difference between the true and bank discount of a note of \$800 due in six months at 6 per cent interest, discounted at 10 per cent. Ans. \$2.64.

IX. Find the value in United States money of 40 pounds, 8 shillings. Ans. \$106.60.

X. Prove that the square root of

CHURCH RE DEDICATED

The Methodist Church at Kingston, which has been closed for several weeks for improvements, was reopened on Sabbath, the 22nd ult, with appropriate services. Rev. W D Thomas, the new pastor, preached in the morning, Rev. J McIvor (Presbyterian) in the afternoon, and Rev. A. F. Browne, (Baptist) in the evening. The services were of a very impressive character throughout and in every way suited to the occasion. Over flowing congregations ruled at all the services, while in the afternoon and evening many could not obtain even standing room in the church. The total cost of repairing and improving the building amounts to \$650. This is nearly covered by subscription, and the balance is almost met by the large offerings received on Sunday, so that but a small debt still remains on the church. The edifice now presents a most attractive appearance and abundantly evidences the liberality of the people. The improvements are quite extensive and modern, everything about the interior being new and up-to-date, while the exterior has been repainted in good taste, and in part remodeled with excellent effect. The ceiling has been arched and wainscoted in stained spruce, new pews of polished birch and ash put in, the platform reconstructed and recarpeted and a modern pulpit supplied along with new chairs for the choir, the walls sheathed and papered anew in harmony with the ceiling and new matting for the aisle. Beautiful pendant lamps, etc, were also provided. The workmanship throughout reflects credit on the skill and taste of the contractors, Messrs Schurman, Lefurgey, Clark & Co. We hope that the re-dedication of their beautified sanctuary will prove the beginning of a new era of prosperity for the Methodists of Kingston.
