## Americans Chart 6-Point Program For Korea

### Scattered Fighting As Mop-Up Of Reds Continues In Korea

TOKYO, Sept. 28 (Friday) — (AP)—Beaten Red invaders of South Korea scurried in headlong flight today for their homeland north of the 38th parallel.

Their last resistance inside the war-torn old capital of Seoul was an end. Their army was smashed and in imminent danger of annihilation.

#### Huge Mop-Up Operation

United Nations forces conducting a huge mop-up operation in the south recaptured Taejon, highway and rail hub 90 miles south of Seoul; Namwon, 42 miles northwest of Chinnju and Hadong, 20 miles southeast of Chinnju.

#### Reds Flee From Seoul

A U.S. 10th Corps communique issued early Friday said the last of the Reds in Seoul withdrew north towards Uijongbu, Uijongbu is a highway hub 12 miles north of Seoul and 18 miles south of the 38th parallel dividing line which the North Koreans crossed June 25 in their surprise assault on the southern republic.

The communists said the U. S. 1st Marine Division cleaned out the final pockets of resistance in Seoul and moved on to high ground north and northwest of the city.

In Southeastern Seoul, held by the U. S. 7th Infantry Division, Red resistance also ceased.

American troops sauntered, relaxed, through the debris-littered heart of the city. They had won it from the Reds in a seven-day siege and assault.

The correspondent Don Whiteside quoted Col. Lewis (Cherry) Puller, commander of the 1st Marine Regiment that the last Reds pulled out of the city at 8 p.m. Wednesday (5 a.m. EDT Wednesday).

The Reds' political commissars long since had made a silk withdrawal, leaving hardly even a scrap of paper behind.

Residents of the shattered city of 1,000,000 emerged from their hiding places and poked in the rubble of their now peaceful old capital. They were looking for odds and ends with which to start life anew.

There were small, sporadic flashes of action elsewhere in South Korea as stubborn North Korean Reds, some trapped and some fleeing, fought briefly but ineffectually.

TORQUAY, England, Sept. 28 (Reuters)—Speeches by American, British and French trade chiefs brought into the open prickly issues likely to stir the great international tariffs conference which opened here today.

## British Labor Wins By-election

LEICESTER, England, Sept. 28 (CP)—Labor today won its fourth straight by-election since last February's general election when the Government candidate was victorious in this provincial city.

At the same time, the death today of a Conservative member of Parliament raised Labor's overall majority in the House of Commons to nine.

The by-election was to fill a seat vacant when the sitting Labor member was appointed a judge.

The winning candidate in today's contest, A. L. Ungeod-Thomson, polled 18,777 votes against 13,642 for the Conservative candidate, H. A. Taylor. It was a straight two-way fight.

The general election had been contested by a Liberal and a Communist. Labor's majority then over the combined Opposition was only 678 votes higher than today's majority over the sole Conservative opponent. This time the Liberals backed the Conservative candidate.

Just before the verdict was announced the Conservative member for Handsworth, Birmingham, died after a lengthy illness. He was Harold Roberts, 66, a member since 1945. A by-election will be held to fill the seat.

Two other by-elections are pending, both in districts won by the Conservatives in the last election.
