Age at death—Under 5 years, 2; from 10 to 37, 4; from 37 to 75, 7; at 83, 1. Average age at death, 49.9 years. Religion—Protestants, 3; Catholics, 6. Nationality—English, 3; Scotch, 6; Irish, 4; French, 1. Sex—Males, 8; females, 6.

The crew had barely time to save themselves. The Sutton was to be sold at auction to-day for the benefit of all concerned."

THE GOLDEN JUBILEE

Of the Very Rev. Monsignor Macdonald

Particulars of the Celebration at the Convent.

The celebration of the golden jubilee of the Very Rev. Monsignor James Macdonald V. G., pastor of St. Andrew's was a pleasing feature in the closing exercises at Notre Dame Convent, which took place on the 27th of June. It has already been favorably alluded to and to-day we take pleasure in giving a more detailed account for the gratification of the numerous friends of the worthy prelate, to whom it was dedicated, and of the institution on which it reflects so much credit.

The exercises were held in the music hall, which was tastefully decorated for the occasion. Appropriate mottoes adorned the walls, as "Quid Retribuam Domino," "Magnificet anima mea Dominum," "In te Domine, Speravi." Conspicuous among the inscriptions were the dates "June 26, 1842," "June 26, 1892," and "50" in gilt letters.

Monsignor Macdonald little dreamed of a celebration in his honor, having consented to preside at the distribution of prizes in the absence of Bishop Macdonald. He was, therefore, not a little surprised, on entering the department, to see the festal decorations and was still more taken aback by the programme of exercises, which read as follows:

A MYSTERY AND ITS SOLUTION. Grand Chorus—"Joy Bells of the Golden Jubilee"..... Music—"Kassassin"..... Vocal Duet—"The Lily and the Rose"..... A Tribute of Gratitude and Respect..... Little Ones' Floral Offering..... Distribution of Prizes..... Consecration to Our Immaculate Mother..... A Word of Thanks.....

The exercises opened by "Marche Triumphale," which was well executed—then sweet childish voices rang out in a song of welcome. The "Blue Bells of Scotland," on harp, piano and violin, elicited well merited applause, and the calliothone exercises by the younger pupils won smiles of approbation from all. The solo, "The Song that Reached my Heart," was listened to with pleasure, and was followed by a dialogue, entitled "A Mystery and its Solution." This was the central point of interest in the programme. It was opened by one of the pupils, who spoke of the bright promises of vacation and alluded to the shadow cast over the commencement day by the absence of the much loved bishop of the diocese. She was interrupted by another pupil, whose curiosity was excited by the dates and inscriptions on the walls. As they conversed together, wondering what all might signify, a number of young girls attired in white and wearing white veils, entered. Each bore a rolled parchment. They announced themselves as messengers of the past, and relating the enterprises of the most curious of the pupils regarding the inscriptions, related incidents from the life of a "just man, dear to angels and men." One recalled his baptism, when the name of the apostle, surnamed the just, was conferred on the young christian, whose spiritual birth was celebrated with so much joy. A second alluded to a touching scene at his first communion, when he felt the call to a sublime vocation. Another spoke of his confirmation, whilst a fourth dwelt long and lovingly on an ordination ceremony in Champlain's city, inviting her hearers to enter the sacred portals of Quebec's time-honored cathedral and assist at it in spirit. One after another the messengers of the past related the zeal and labors of the new levite, now at St. Mary's, Indian River, then at St. Peter's and St. Paul's, Summerside, where he founded a Convent for the education of the young, tracing his life till he became Rector of St. Dunstan's College and eventually pastor of St. Andrew's, his native parish.

A young girl representing the present then entered, bearing a magnificent memento of the occasion, in the form of a St. Andrew's Cross, wreathed in wax flowers, in itself a family history, dating down from 1772, when the good ship Alexander bore Monsignor Macdonald's father with many others to our shores. The young girl also bore the smiles of the present with bright hopes for the future to Very Reverend Monsignor Macdonald, whose golden jubilee they celebrated. All bide her welcome. Then a pupil stepped forward and read the following:

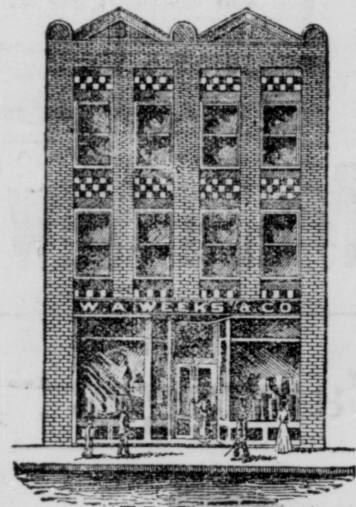
ADDRESS: To Very Rev. Mgr. James Macdonald, V. G., Pastor of St. Andrew's, P. E. Island.

Our hearts are in full sympathy with the event, and respond as the chords of a musical instrument when touched by the artist's hand. Very loving and sincere are the congratulations we offer, heartfelt of respect and veneration the homage we tender, heartfelt and very earnest the wishes we offer for the preservation of a life so precious to the holy church.
