HOW THE MONEY GOES.

In the House of Commons a short while ago Mr. Martin, the energetic representative of East Queens, asked for a statement showing the expenditure on China Point wharf. This statement was brought down, and it should prove interesting reading. The total sum covered by the return amounts to \$393.58, a large slice of which goes to what was once upon a time termed the "reptile press." The payments cover the period from February 8th, 1897, to March 6th, 1899. Here are the figures:—

WORLD'S COAL PRODUCTION

THE United States Bureau of Statistics has published some interesting figures showing the coal production and consumption of the world during the past fifteen years. According to these statistics the coal production of the United Kingdom in 1897 was 202,000,000 tons; that of the United States, 179,000,000 tons; Germany, 91,000,000; France 30,000,000; Belgium, 22,000,000; Austria Hungary, 12,000,000; Russia, nearly 10,000,000; Australasia, nearly 5,000,000; Japan, over 5,000,000; British India, 4,000,000; Canada, nearly 4,000,000; and Spain, 2,000,000, while no other country reached 1,000,000 tons in production. It is shown that the United States has gained more rapidly during the fifteen years under consideration than has the United Kingdom, or, indeed, any of the important coal-producing countries of the world, her gain during the fifteen years being over 73 per cent while that of the United Kingdom is less than 24 per cent. But as an exporter of coal the United States takes low rank in proportion to the production, standing only fourth on the list. Canada exported about 1,250,000 tons of coal in 1897. Her importations are nearly 4,000,000 tons. Great Britain is the largest consumer of coal in proportion to population, her consumption in 1897 being 3.87 tons per capita. Canada's per capita of consumption is 1.25.

OPEN LETTER NO. 3

To the Honorable Donald Farquharson, the Unsound Premier.

Sir,—All false forms of Government must yield their sway to God's command—"Let there be light." The laws of God are never changed, are full of wisdom, justice and love. They are written all over the face of creation and in the heart of man, and through all these the voice of God proclaims—"Let there be light." Not so with your party and your Government. You hide the public matters of this province and swim on the surface of the flowing river like a dead log that will shortly be over the precipice. When the Liberals assumed power in 1894, if you and they had displayed the wisdom which you professed in opposition the credit of this province would stand higher to-day. If the magnetic ties of human sympathy which bind all mankind in a common brotherhood, had pervaded your soul as individuals or as a party, you would not have pursued the reckless course which you did. Experience and time will mature most men and leave them better qualified to direct legislation and enable them to comprehend the great principle of governmental justice. Not so with yourself and the octogenarian fossils who are associated with you. A man or a party who does not live up to the principles he gives public utterance to on the hustings must be regarded as an unprincipled man, and "unsound" and dangerous to be left in control of the public interests. It is hinted that you were responsible for the delay in appointing a Lieutenant Governor and that your schemes are now at the bottom of the delay in making an appointment for Judge of Queen's County Court.

Experience, forsooth! Your experience had only one object and aim in life—selfishness. The experience of past ages—of orators and philosophers and statesmen—Confucius, Zoroaster, Moses, David, Solomon, Lycurgus, Demosthenes, Cicero, Bonaparte, Washington, Sir John A. Macdonald and Alexander McKenzie and all British statesmen are lost upon you. The minds of these men and their examples should render you better qualified than you are to direct legislation. Education and experience is lost upon you. Who will be a Moses to lead the people of this Island and Dominion out of Egypt, and save us from the thralldom of chicanery and deception—save us from false principles and promises? At the last general election you and your party assured us that Mr. Laurier had promised arbitration—and that the claims of this Province against the Federal Government would be arbitrated upon and the great light of liberalism would give the Island a sufficient sum to save us from taxation. That bubble, worse than the delusion of the credit "mobiliary" is now exploded and even the expired gas which you expended in creating it is now invisible. You are ashamed to resurrect it. What will your next dodge be? What promises will you obtain from Sir Louis and Sir Wilfrid to place in your magic lantern for the electors at the next election. You are, unless gospel hardened, aware that the preachers denounce these sins with great vehemence and that "a liar is not to be believed even should he speak the truth." Your party has made so many false promises for the sake of power and self gain that no intelligent community can place any dependence upon you. Honest men who speak the truth and fear a lie are defeated in the face of the false promises made by yourself and your party. But the end is nigh and the great Judge will at the next great tribunal of the next election declare in your hearing, "depart ye wicked and accursed deceivers, I know you not." The boom of the thunder created by your deception is now resounding in your ears, and no wonder you are trembling. The dashaway policy of Mr. Sinclair and the squandering of the public assets of the land office will not save you from the destruction which is inevitable. Will you cry a halt? Will you make public the financial bankruptcy that is now staring us in the face? Your conduct as a party is like an unprincipled merchant who hides his affairs from examination in the hope that his borrowing capacity may increase and rob Peter to pay Paul. This will all

come to an end and when the historian shall place an epitaph on your tombstone it will be, "Here lies Donald the 'unsound' once premier of P. E. Island."
