VALUABLE CANADIAN STAMPS.—In the recent sales of foreign stamps at Charing Cross, London, Canadian stamps brought fair prices. Among the largest were:—Canada—10d, blue unused, £7 15s; 12d black, unused, £27. Newfoundland—4d orange, unused, £11. 1s orange, unused £27; 6d carmine, unused, £10 15s. Nova Scotia—1s violet, used, £22 5s.

A BIG OUTPUT.—It is said that one of the paper mills of the E. B. Eddy Co., at Hull, is now running full time, making nothing else but white paper for the Montreal Star. The orders received from the Star for December call for nearly eight tons a day, more than the combined consumption of all the other afternoon papers in the city of Montreal, French and English together.

THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION.—This being the Feast of the Immaculate Conception services were held in St. Dunstan's Cathedral as on Sunday. This evening at seven o'clock there will be a special service in the Convent, De Notre Dame, under the auspices of the Children of Mary. A sermon appropriate to the occasion will be delivered, and a number of new members will be received into the Society.

WATERWORKS AND SEWERAGE.—A meeting of citizens to consider the report of Professor Lea relating to a system of waterworks and sewerage for the town of Summerside, was held there on Monday evening. The report of Professor Lea was submitted, and the matter was discussed at considerable length after which it was decided to delay action for the present.

BURNED TO DEATH.—A very sad accident occurred a few nights ago in the parish of St. Louis, a few miles from Richibucto. A man named Peter Poirier, who is a bachelor well up in years, was burned to death and his house consumed by the flames. No one knows how the place caught fire, but when the neighbors arrived the form of a man could be seen through the flames, struggling to get out of the building. No assistance could be given the poor man and he perished miserably. The night was windy and the flames were soon fanned to fury, the building and contents being speedily destroyed.

The first two numbers on the programme have been pulled off already and proved very interesting to the society.

Mr. Ross's paper was a masterly effort. He described to us the origin of the drama and compared the plays of Sophocles and Shakespeare, giving us a good digest of one of the principal plays of each author. The discussion on the franchise on last night of meeting, was interesting and instructive. The speaker contended for manhood suffrage with contributing to the revenue as the only qualification. The respondent would prefer to have a degree of education and intelligence as qualifications for exercising the franchise. The speakers who followed mostly favored the views held by the respondent.

In connection with this society there is a circulating library of over 300 volumes, containing the cream of literature, ancient and modern, in history, science, philosophy, biography, poetry, fiction, etc. New books are added as the funds of the society will allow. This society has been a great benefit to the place, and by placing such an excellent library in the way of the young people many have formed tastes for literature who would otherwise have neglected to furnish themselves with good reading matter. A fee of 50c per annum from each member is all that is charged for the privileges of the society and library.
