Of this amount \$1,033,693 were free goods and \$6,392,454 dutiable goods, on which duties to the amount of \$1,276,475.86 were collected.

THE TESTIMONIAL FOR THE CHAMPION CREW.—The fund to be presented the champion crew of Halifax amounts to about \$2,000. On account of the recent sudden death of Obed Smith—an account of which appears on our first page—one of the crew, the presentation will not be public as was intended. The money will be handed to the Mayor who will divide it into five equal portions and will on Thursday quietly hand one portion to each of the four survivors (including the spare man) of the crew. The fifth portion will go to the parents of Obed Smith.

DESTRUCTION OF THE BUFFALO.—The average annual destruction of the buffaloes during the last thirty or forty years is estimated by a writer in the Penn Monthly at between three and four millions. During the season of 1872-'73 no less than two thousand hunters, it is said, were engaged in hunting the buffalo along the line of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railroad alone. By these men at least 250,000 buffaloes were slain, simply for their hides, the carcasses being left untouched on the plains. At this rate, the bison will have utterly disappeared before many years unless Government interferes to prevent this wasteful slaughter.

A CORRESPONDENT of the King's County Advertiser reflects very pertinently on the manner in which Dr. Robertson was eulogized at a seat in the Government. If the author of the letter referred to is not the Dr., himself, he must be some man well informed as to the Dr.'s sentiments. His allusion to the "unsoundness" of Dr. W. D. Stewart, is very significant. The Hon. evidently expected a higher premium, would have been set on his undoubted honesty on the School Question. If the townspeople are considerably ashamed of it, Mr. Byrne's trustworthiness or efficiency has never been questioned, and in his official capacity I understand that he is second to none on the line. Well, why is this? I suppose the incumbent of the Georgetown station was rather averse to country life; and some of the colour-sergeants brought the force of circumstances to bear so forcibly on the Superintendent that the transfer was the only remedy which he thought would heal."

TRIAL OF POTATO DIGGERS.—To solve the problem of successfully digging potatoes by machinery has long been the ambition of many of our mechanics. Scheme after scheme has been resorted to. Trial after trial has been made. Yet the ideal has not been reached. Advances towards it have, however, rewarded the efforts put forth; and the trial on Tuesday was not without satisfactory results. The Potato diggers entered for exhibition were owned as follows:—Wm. McKenzie, Lot 48; George Raskham, Charlottetown; McKinnon & McLean, Charlottetown; E. & J. Weatherly, Lot 48. The diggers were tested as follows: Best—William McKenzie's; partly because of lighter draft, but principally from leaving the land level for the potatoes to be so next drill to fall upon, so as not to be so much buried by falling clay. The Judges were Jas. Laird, Jr., New Glasgow; Andrew West, West River, Lot 65; F. Bell, Dickson, West River, Lot 65; John Doyle, South Shore, Lot 65.

A coal bed of 15,000 acres has been discovered near Barnsley, Yorkshire. Lord Carnarvon, in speaking very recently on the Eastern question, said a great European war might now be in the balance. This occurred in the Township of Hamilton. The stalks were about six inches high. If we all sit still and wait until the insect is introduced, after repeated warnings, and knowing the mischief it will do and is doing in the States, our children will not thank us, and future generations will, perhaps, find potatoes as costly as we do the native oysters."
