MONDAY
OTTAWA, June 1 (Special)—A partial answer to the contention of J. Angus MacLean, joint Progressive Conservative member for Queen's, that Prince Edward Island is receiving a meagre share of defence contracts was given by Defence Production Minister Howe a few minutes before the Commons rose for its week-end recess.

Mr. MacLean had also charged that the government had failed to carry out a sane program of decentralization of industry. As has been done in the United Kingdom and the United States.

The Defence Production Minister told the House that his department had awarded "smaller" ship building contracts in Charlottetown and other centres of the Maritimes. It was uneconomic, he said to establish a large defence industry in a smaller centre, particularly if that industry would have to close after two years.

Three young men were ordained to the Priesthood by Most Rev. James Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown in an impressive ordination ceremony at Saint Dunstan's Basilica Saturday morning.

His Excellency conferred Holy Orders on Rev. Preston Hammill, Preetown; Rev. Justin MacDonald, Grand River and Rev. Adrien Arsenault, Mount Carmel.

The Ordination Mass was celebrated by His Excellency Bishop Boyle assisted by Rev. P. F. MacDonald and Rev. Francis Corcoran. Rev. Patrick McMahon, D.D. was master of ceremonies.

Serious acts of vandalism on two Saturday nights in succession have been reported by Mr. G. B. McGillivray, supervisor of the National Park. He stated that on the past two Saturdays people had used the kitchen shelters provided in the Park and then left the buildings almost in ruins. Last Saturday night a group completely wrecked the shelter at Stanhope and then broke into the one at Dalway where they repeated their destruction.

"We are only too glad to give service to people who use things properly, but we have too much work to do to spend all our time repairing the damage caused by vandals," Mr. McGillivray said. He stated that the R. C. M. Police were being notified and they would endeavour to locate those responsible. Because the Park is Federal property such acts of vandalism carry a heavy penalty.

Lobster fishermen at Alberton and Tignish areas are busily engaged in salvaging as much gear as can possibly be repaired and reset following last week's disastrous storm, but are finding the task an extremely difficult one. At Tignish hundreds of traps are being hauled from the wharves to the various homes where repairs are being made. A number of men do not expect to be able to continue fishing this season and many others will be held up the better part of this week before being able to run lines again.

Atwood and Walter Gavin and Reggie McCue of Tignish, who had their boats destroyed, do not expect to be able to replace them this season. Howland Gavin also of Tignish was able to salvage only eighteen traps of his entire gear. Several other boats were damaged during the storm but can be repaired.

TUESDAY
OTTAWA, June 2 (Special)—Contract for breakwater repairs at Rustico Harbor has been awarded to the Antigonish, N. S. firm of Alexander McIsaac for \$39,831, it was learned here today from J. Watson MacNaught, Liberal member for Prince.

This is the second award for work at Rustico this year, the first having been made some time ago for the landing at that active lobster-fishing centre. The contract for breakwater repairs at Rustico contains provisions for use of as many ex-service men as feasible and for the use of local labor whenever possible. Actual work is expected to begin shortly, as soon as the contractor has been able to assemble his materials and recruit the essential labor force. Mr. McIsaac was the lowest of five tenders.

Miminegash Contract
A contract for breakwater repairs at Miminegash, Prince County has been awarded to J. Arthur Martin of Bloomfield, P. E. I. Mr. MacNaught told The Guardian. Amount of the tender which was the lowest of three submitted to the public works department, is \$18,014.

The Miminegash project is continuation of repair work which has been in progress for the past three or four years. The present contract plus a certain amount of day labor is expected to put the Miminegash breakwater in first-class condition for some years to come.

Work will be started as soon as the contractor can get his materials and men on the job.

Major J. D. Stewart went into action yesterday in an attempt to remove the barrier of secrecy or indifference that surrounds the movements of Prince Edward Island veterans returning from service in foreign fields. "Just why these men cannot be met on arrival and given a hearty and sincere welcome home, is a matter of deep regret, and I am communicating with the authorities at Halifax and elsewhere with a view to remedying this unnatural situation," he said. "In fact," His Worship added, "if necessary we will contact the Minister of National Defence, Mr. Claxton, and urge that arrangements be made to have someone in authority in Charlottetown, advised of the date of arrival here of all returned men."

"I am hoping that a sub-depot will be established in the City, with funds available to meet the reasonable needs for entertaining these men, especially when they have to remain here over night, while en route to their homes," the Mayor said. "In any case, when negotiations have reached the stage when further action is indicated, I shall be glad to appoint a strong citizen's committee to co-operate with the Legion or any other body interested in remedying the situation."

WEDNESDAY
OTTAWA, June 3—Paving of the road from Dalway to Cavenish in the Prince Edward Island National Park will be completed by the Federal Government this year, Resources Minister R. H. Winter told W. Chester McLure (P.C.—Queen's) in the House last night.

The Minister also estimated that a total of \$960,000 would be spent on the Trans-Canada highway on Prince Edward Island in 1952 with the cost evenly divided between the Federal and Provincial Governments. In New Brunswick the Provincial-Federal expenditure on the highway this year estimated at \$725,000.

Four briefs have been filed with the Legislative Transportation Committee for presentation when they open hearings on the application of the Canadian National Railways for permission to modernize transportation facilities by substituting bus and truck services for present mixed train services in the Province.

The hearings on the application will open in Charlottetown Monday morning, June 3, in the Court House. It is expected that morning and afternoon sessions will be held that day with the possibility of another session on Tuesday afternoon. The final hearings here will be held Wednesday morning and afternoon if necessary. The closing date for the filing of briefs was Saturday, May 31.

Presenting briefs for consideration are the applicant company, Canadian National Railway, Charlottetown Board of Trade; the Railway Transportation Brotherhoods; and Island Motor Transport Ltd., which for several years has operated bus services in the Province.

THUR
Eastern Command Headquarters in Halifax yesterday released a list of Canadian Army personnel from Prince Edward Island returning on rotation leave from Korea. The draft will disembark at a United States port June 4 and the men will immediately leave for their homes.

Those listed are: Gunner H. C. Dennis, Charlottetown; Gunner J. G. DesRoches, Muscouche; Gunner J. Gallant, Summerside; Gunner R. Marshall, Covehead; Gunner R. MacDonald, Charlottetown; Gunner G. MacSweeney, Murray River; Gunner E. P. MacKinnon, Mount Stewart.

"It is very gratifying to know that Mayor Stewart has started ball rolling towards the establishment of a Military sub-depot in the city, which will enable our people to give the returned men a proper welcome home," said Mr. Charles M. Sinclair, president of the Charlottetown branch of the Canadian Legion yesterday, when asked what the attitude of the Legion would be towards such a move. "As veterans, most of us have experienced the joy and satisfaction of being received by friends and relatives in the old home town atmosphere of good-will and appreciation, after enduring the hardship and rigorous experience of war," he said. "That we should take an active part and a premier position in extending a similar welcome to the present day campaigners, is a foregone conclusion." He assured that the facilities of the Legion Quarters and the hearty co-operation of the Charlottetown Branch will be forthcoming when required.

FRIDAY
Potatoes, which had soared to record heights in recent months, took a sudden drop in this Province yesterday which ranged from 50 to 75 cents per bag. While there was no particular reason for the drop it is believed that several factors entered into the sensational decline.

Early this week the 75-pound bags had reached nearly \$6.00, an all-time high for local production. The factors causing the drop were believed to be a slight accumulation due to a number of cars piling up for shipment and the entry into the market of new potatoes being shipped from Southern United States. The potato market customarily takes a slump when new potatoes first hit it, and generally the price continues to decline from then on.

However, men familiar with market conditions believe that recent high prices will again prevail as soon as the first impact from the new arrivals has spent its force. Last night they expressed the opinion that the price of \$6 per bag would be surpassed within a short time as it is not expected that there will be a sufficient quantity of new potatoes to take up the slack in the demand.

Mr. Donald L. MacQuarrie Hampton, who received a Bachelor of Science degree at Dalhousie University Convocation, left yesterday morning for Newfoundland where he has accepted a position as junior geologist with the Buchans Mining Company.

The first mackerel of the season were landed at Alberton South yesterday morning in boats belonging to Upton Fraser and Maurice Perry, Sr. The larger catch, that belonging to Upton Fraser, numbered seven hundred. While this is considerably smaller than last year's first catch, it is hoped that within a few days catches will improve. Several other fishermen set their nets yesterday and others are being put out this morning.
