Business Notes.

(From the Monetary Times.)

The noteworthy increase in the traffic and in the profits of the Great Western and Grand Trunk Railways has been followed by a corresponding improvement in the current value of their stocks. Twelve months ago the ordinary stock of the Grand Trunk, nominal value £100, could be bought in London at from £6 7s. 6d. to £16 12s. 6d., and the first preferences at from £39 to £40. From that period a steady rise set in, and the last week of April opened with quotations for the former security of a fraction over £25, and for the latter of from £84 to £89—commenting upon which the *Railway World*, of Philadelphia, considers that:—"While various influences have contributed to this revival of prosperity, its main cause is an increase in the actual and prospective amount of the inter-state commerce of this country transacted on these lines, and an improvement in the rates appertaining to this traffic."

Not satisfied with the already large Government Deposit of \$76,246, the directors of the Mutual Life Association of Canada have supplemented this sum with an amount sufficient to increase the deposit to over \$80,000, thus giving the policy holders security to the extent of nearly 80 per cent of their claims. The assurance of the directors, that they will continue to add to this fund until it reaches an amount equal to all policies in force, cannot fail to command the fullest approval of present and intending assureds. The securities, that constitute this governmental reserve, return the company a revenue of nearly 6 1/2 per cent.

An enterprising New Brunswicker, Mr. Burns, of Fredericton, is about extending his fruit-canning business this season to include tomatoes, corn, rhubarb, strawberries, raspberries, and peas, in addition to his present successful venture in "pork and beans."

The death of Senator Brown, superinduced by a pistol wound fired by one of his late employes, removes from amongst us a man of action in many walks, and of prominence in each one. Politician, journalist, legislator, and active in all three, he nevertheless found time to set farmers an example of raising superior cattle. He had as much business dash as political energy. In his time he had made and lost large sums; and he must have died worth a considerable amount. His life was insured, in three different companies, for an aggregate of \$60,000. The regret felt at his untimely death by large numbers of people throughout Canada, is augmented by the manner in which it was brought about.

The number of Canadian ships sold to countries during the last fiscal year was seventy two, of 19,318 tons valued at \$529,824, bringing this year \$27,47 per ton, much less than average. In 1878 there were ninety-five vessels sold whose tonnage was 35,209 tons and which brought \$1,236,145 being at the remunerative price of \$35.12 per ton measurement. The tonnage built throughout the Dominion last year amounted to 103,551 tons against 106,975 in 1878. An increase is shown by every province except Quebec and P. E. Island, Nova Scotia built 50,975 tons against 47,639 tons in 1878, and New Brunswick 32,135 tons as compared with 26,306 in the previous year.

Japan has rejected the offer of a Russian alliance.

Boyd, the oarsman, sails for New York on the 21st.

Bismarck and the King of Saxony have had several long interviews together.

Riots caused by men on strike at Lille and Rheims, in France, have been suppressed.

Sir John Lubbock, it is said, will be chosen to represent London University in the Commons.

Lord Elgin and Lord Sandhurst will respectively move and second the address in the House of Lords.

The Imperial Parliament will appoint another commission to enquire into the Contagious Diseases Act.

The Spanish Government intends to introduce in Cuba agricultural schools and a reformed system of education.

The Blackburn masters have agreed on concerted action in regard to the strikers, and the operatives are greatly disheartened at their position.

There are rumors that Great Britain has in contemplation another European Congress on the subject of the unfulfilled clauses of the Treaty of Berlin.

A week will probably elapse before Abdur Rakman Khan's reply to the conditional offer of the Amership is received. If he accepts he will come to Cabul to learn the terms on which the English support of his pretensions depends. Moosa Khan has sent in a forcible letter which replied to the letter also sent by the British Commission to Moosa Khan asking him to assist in maintaining peace.

QUEBEC, May 17.

Great preparations are being made here in military circles and by the Citizens Committee for the celebration of the 24th. About 3,000 troops will take part in the review and sham fight. If Sir Leopold McClintock's fleet arrives here in time the frigates will take part in the attack on the Citadel, assailing it from the river.

Prince Leopold will be present and will witness the review. Apartments are being fitted up for his reception in the Citadel.

The Governor General and H. R. H. Princess Louise will arrive here on Friday next, and a few days after the 28th it is their intention to proceed down the St. Lawrence to their summer fishing grounds.

BRIGHTON, Ont., May 17.

In Prince Edward, yesterday morning, near Concession, a man named Thos. Thomson shot and instantly killed a young man named John Emmond. The cause is supposed to be jealousy.

OTTAWA, May 14.

The Governor General, and his brother, Lord Archibald Campbell, to-day, visited the Parliament Buildings, the Chaudiere Falls and lumber mills. To-morrow they drive to Chelsea Mountains, and on Thursday, the whole party, with the Princess Louise, go by special train to Quebec. They will soon be joined by Prince Leopold.

The Supreme Court of Canada will close proceedings for this term to-morrow. The Law Society of Canada has suggested to the Court certain changes in the regulation which are for the better convenience of the bar.

NEW YORK, May 17.

The "Evening Telegram" has the following special by cable:-

JAMAICA, W. I., May 17.

The Government of the Cuban Republic has been constituted as follows:-

President-Cabix de Garcia of Holquin.
Minister of War-Pio Rosado.
Agent in the United States, residing at Key West-Senor Bavastro.

Agent in New York-Jose Francisco Lamadriz, of Matanzas, late Cuban Agent at Key West.

The landing of the Expedition has been most successful, the ammunition and arms being put ashore in good order.

LONDON, May 17.

The "Times" says the Indian Government paid nine to ten shillings more freight on rails to India than private contractors and other similar arrangements are too numerous to mention. The subject will probably come before Parliament.

The report of the Veterinary Department of the Privy Council says that the Orders-in-Council enjoining the slaughter of cattle, sheep and pigs from the United States have been fully justified. In 1879 there were imported from America 157 cattle affected with pleuro-pneumonia, 33 sheep with foot and mouth disease, 37 sheep with scab and 974 swine of the fever.

The number of cattle infected with disease, imported from the United States, largely exceeds the total number of cases of disease detected among the cattle imported in the same period from European countries.

WASHINGTON, May 17.

The President has addressed Congress on the subject of the alleged Fortue Bay outrage upon American fishermen. He asks the immediate and careful attention of Congress to the failure of accord between the two governments as to the interpretation and execution of the fishery articles of the treaty of Washington.

The President concurs in the views presented by the Secretary of State as to the measures proposed to be taken by the Government in the maintenance of the rights accorded to our fishermen by British concessions in the treaty, and in procuring suitable action toward securing an indemnity for the injury which this interest has already suffered.

BALLSTON SPA, N. Y., May 17.

The Prospect House, at Lake George, was destroyed by forest fires this afternoon. The fire is extending through the forest to Caldwell Village, where Fort William Henry Hotel is situated. Fears are entertained for the safety of the village; the inhabitants are now fighting the fire.

PARIS, May 17.

M. Tirard, Minister of Commerce, in speaking in the department of Gers, to-day, said the country was proceeding steadily in the path of progress and liberty, and prepared to repeal all aggression; that the Republic was ready to stretch out its arms to all children of France, even to those who cherished unjust prejudices, and that the Government was far from being desirous of initiating religious persecution, but resolved to enforce the strict execution of the laws. Decrees appointing M. Constant, Minister of the Interior and Worship, vice Lepere, resigned, have been signed.

WASHINGTON, May 17.

Boats were sold to-night on the boat race. At the opening odds were 100 to 75 on Hanlan. But later on 100 to 60 on Hanlan were the prevailing figures. The oarsmen were both upon the river to-day, although the water was too rough this morning to admit of their going over the course. Both are reported in good condition to-night and no one seems to entertain any serious doubt that the race will come on Wednesday.
