sequence of plays if declarer adopted it, since this method of dealing with the club combination is the generally accepted as proper from the standpoint of both mathematics and good technique.

But when this deal was actually played, declarer succeeded in making the contract. Declarer was Waldemar von Zedwitz, celebrated New York expert.

Never one to follow blindly any generally accepted principle, von Zedwitz decided against tackling the delicate trump situation until he had obtained more information about the composition of the defenders' cards.

After winning the diamond return at trick two, he cashed the A-K of spades. West being forced to contribute the jack. He then led the queen of spades. West discarded a diamond.

Convinced that West did not have the ten of clubs, which he probably would have ruffed with if he had it, and that West did not have worthless clubs or he would have trumped the spade, von Zedwitz placed West with the queen.

He therefore led the jack of clubs, and it was curtains for the opposition. When West ducked the jack, von Zedwitz played low from dummy and had no trouble making the rest of the tricks. It would have done West no good to cover the jack with the queen.

The queen was dead either way.

Howard Green Is Seen Master Of Diplomacy

Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA (CP) — If Howard Green's handshakes have anywhere near the effect on world councils that they have on the Commons, Canada will be making a whopping contribution to peace.

Canada's new external affairs minister seems to be weaving a kind of magic over the often-turbulent House. All is peace, at least so far as Mr. Green is concerned.

The ambidextrous Mr. Green has been doing a juggling act recently with two top portfolios, handling external with one hand and public works with the other. Either is enough to keep a top-notch busy from morning until night.

To add to it, Mr. Green still holds his job as a sort of straw boss of the Commons as government floor leader. This means he does out the working schedule of the House a few days — or perhaps even a week — in advance, a very neat trick of manoeuvring if it can be done right.

FLOWING SMOOTHLY

The 63-year-old lawyer from Vancouver appears to be doing it right, because House business in the closing days of the session is flowing along smoothly towards the prorogation target date of next Saturday.

"No other man could have done it," says a reluctantly admiring political opponent in discussing Mr. Green's technique.

It is all the more surprising in Mr. Green's case because, while the jobs he now has call for a political smoothie, he was noted in opposition for being a sort of professional sourpuss. He complained about almost anything the former Liberal government did.

"I guess I was the greatest whiner this House ever saw," he recalls with what now is the usual, disarming Green smile.

Mr. Green was a favorite opponent of former Liberal strong man C. D. Howe, who once described him in the Commons as a man who stalked the halls of Parliament with a Bible in one hand and a stiletto in the other.

LOOKED SOMBER

Mr. Green carries neither a Bible nor a stiletto, but in those pre-activity days he did carry a pre-occupied or dedicated look that made him appear forbiddingly somber.

But now there is the "new look" Howard Green, one of the surprises wrought by the change of government. In office, he is bouncy and apparently happy, even though the jobs he tows are highly demanding. And there is general, genuine affection for this 19-year veteran of the House.

One reason for his success within the Commons is that Mr. Green has technique, to the extent that some of his cabinet colleagues will take perhaps years to learn.

To press gallery observers, it is a combination of patience, understanding, willingness to give and take and — perhaps most important — knowing when to keep your mouth shut.

MAY BE RECORDED

Mr. Green is adept at all. And he uses them to fine advantage in putting through the House in two days the spending estimates of two major departments — public works and external affairs. Probably never before have these gone through so fast.

Through his normally-difficult period of getting through the big spending appropriations of his two departments, Mr. Green relaxed and took all the arrows without saying a word of protest or defence.

At the end, he would get up and mention the suggestions made by each individual member, thank him politely and tell him it would be given full consideration, meaning in most cases that it is due for the wastebasket. But it looks good on the official record for the folks back home.

"BAN PRIVATE DRINKS

WASHINGTON (AP) — It could cost an American \$1,000 to take a sip from a private flask aboard a commercial airliner beginning next fall. The federal aviation agency set up the maximum fine of \$1,000 in proposed new regulations for use of alcoholic beverages aboard planes. The regulations — effective in 60 days — would ban drinking any alcoholic beverage not served by the airline itself and would prohibit serving of alcoholic drinks by the airlines to intoxicated persons.
