## A SON BADLY FOOLED.

Dug Fifteen Feet to Find His Father's Hidden Fortune.

LONDON, Aug. 17.—Some people are not satisfied with making themselves objectionable during life, but must needs contrive to leave behind them such plans as will, when carried out, cause further suffering or annoyance.

Some time ago there died an old farmer, supposed to have been wealthy, who for years had been at war with his only son, whom he had turned out of doors. The deceased man's papers showed that the only sum of money which could be traced was less than \$1,000, which was bequeathed to two friends, who were appointed executors of the farmer's will.

This document declared that whereas the farmer had been greatly disappointed in his son, he had decided to leave all his wealth to him only on condition that he proved himself a man of grit and perseverance, which so far he had not done.

The test the executors were to see properly performed was for the son to pass an examination at a certain college for agriculturists. Then he was to repair to a certain spot in the field, and dig down to a depth of fifteen feet, when he would come upon the fortune his father had desired to leave him.

The conditions of the will were not of a kind the heir particularly cared about, but having no means of his own, and believing, as others did, that his father must have died worth fully \$100,000 he decided to fulfill the conditions.

Three times the heir failed in the examination, but at length he passed, and then went to the executors of his father's will for instructions as to how to set about the actual acquisition of the buried fortune.

After some delay, he, in the presence of the executors and numerous friends, commenced to dig for the fortune. Working single handed, as he was compelled to do, he was laboring for nearly three days ere he came upon an iron-bound box, which he recognized as having been his father's.

On examination it was found to contain nothing more than a note to the effect that the box was the whole fortune, and that his disappointment would be to the son what the son's whole life had been to the father. Subsequent enquiries elicited the fact that shortly before his death the farmer had given nearly \$115,000 away among various charitable institutions.

## Water Famine.

LONDON, August 18.—This has been the driest summer on record here. Only 190 tons of water per acre has fallen instead of the usual average of 610 tons. For 25 days the thermometer has registered a temperature of over 80 degrees.

—Mr. J. S. Larke, Canadian commercial agent for Australia, reporting to the Department of Trade and Commerce under date of July 4th, on the trade between Canada and New Zealand, gives the exports for this colony to the Dominion for the year 1898 as \$18,559, an increase of \$13,400 on the previous year. The imports from Canada were \$37,556, and increase for the year of \$52,905. Besides the increases, Mr. Larke says that the returns show "the introduction of small lots in many lines, showing an activity in an interest in trade with Canada. Much of this was the result of the calling of the Canadian-Australian steamers at Wellington.
