Condition Of Stevedore Is Said Improved

The condition of Reginald Gallant of Mont Carmel, age 18 years, who was seriously injured on Wednesday morning while working on a potato boat at the Marine Wharf in Summerside was reported last night by hospital authorities as being slightly improved although he was still unconscious and still considered to be serious.

Mr. Gallant, while working as stevedore on the potato boat Francis Chorn, slipped on the icy deck and fell into the ship's hold about 20 feet below, striking his head on a steel rail. He was rushed to the Prince County Hospital where it was found that he was suffering from a fractured skull together with concussion.

OTTAWA (CP)—Creamery butter stocks in nine Canadian cities totalled 80,970,000 pounds at Nov. 17, the bureau of statistics reported Tuesday. Holdings were 19 per cent higher than the 68,028,000 pounds a year earlier.

Three Freighters Loading Potatoes At Summerside

Four large freighters, all loading cargo at the Marine Wharf, present a scene of activity never before seen in marine shipping at the port of Summerside.

On the west side of the Pier is the "Francis Chorn" which is discharging a cargo of phosphate for the Canada Packers fertilizer plant and today will sail after completing the loading of about 28,000 bags of potatoes. This ship will proceed to Charlottetown where she will load approximately 30,000 more bags to complete her cargo, which is destined for Florida. Also on the west side of the wharf is the "Sandwich" a Panamanian ship which is loading 55,000 bags of potatoes for Canada Packers. This cargo is destined for Carolina and Virginia ports.

On the east side of the wharf are the "Tesso" which is loading 65,000 bags for George Brookings for a Florida port. The "Kismet" is the "Frans Gorthan" which is loading 1,350 cords of pulpwood for the P.E.I. Produce Company, Summerside. This ship will proceed to Souris to complete the balance of her cargo which is destined for Holland.

P.E.I. Produce will shortly have two more ships docked at Summerside to load pulpwood which is being sent to France. The "Hegra" will load pulpwood at Summerside, Souris and Mulgrave, while the "Marstenen" will load at Summerside, Souris and Georgetown.

Another potato boat "Kismet" is due in Summerside today to be loaded with potatoes for Florida. Around the first of the week the "Union Mariner" is expected in to take on an equally large cargo of potatoes.

East Prince Jr. Farmers Semi-Monthly Meeting

The regular semi-monthly meeting of the East Prince Junior Farmers was held at the Department of Agriculture board rooms, Summerside last evening with nearly one hundred per cent attendance. Still No Acceptance, Date On The Bluenose

OTTAWA (CP)—The \$4,000,000 ferry Bluenose which is to ply between Nova Scotia and Maine was put through new trials early this week but reports on them have yet to be received, Transport Minister Marler said today.

He said he understands the ship, whose delivery is more than a year behind schedule, was given new tests Tuesday and Wednesday. However, no decision as to her acceptance from the builders would be made until the results of these trials are evaluated.

Mr. Marler added that he is "not going to put any acceptance date on the Bluenose." A statement would be issued when the ship was accepted.

He reported in a speech at Halifax a week ago that trials had been carried out Oct. 31 and Nov. 1 but had not satisfied his officials that the vessel should be accepted.

The Bluenose was built for the federal and Nova Scotia governments by Davie Shipbuilding Ltd. of Lauzon, Que. to run between Yarmouth, N. S. and Bar Harbor, Me.

She was to have been delivered in August, 1954, but her launching was delayed and engine troubles beset her since she was launched last May. She burned out some bearings in trials last June and there was delay in getting new bearings from the manufacturers in England.

Young Child Rescued From Smoke-Filled Room In S'side House Yesterday

16-month-old Linda Newport, daughter of Mrs. Revel Newport, was rescued from a bedroom filled with smoke from burning bed clothing, on the second floor of their home on Upper Duke Street in Summerside yesterday afternoon.

The little girl was rescued by Mrs. Cline Court, who, with her husband, were the first persons to enter the dense smoke and save the child from being smothered.

The baby's mother is employed with Smallman's Ltd., and was at work at the time. The little girl together with a brother 2½ and a sister 3½ were in the care of Vera Rogers. Leaving the two older children playing, and the baby asleep in a bed upstairs, Miss Rogers had momentarily gone next door when Mrs. Wesley Currie, residing in another part of the house in which Mrs. Newport lives, discovered the fire.

The two older children were led to safety and before the arrival of the Fire Department, Mr. and Mrs. Cline Court, who are neighbours to the Newport home, entered the smoke filled room and with difficulty in coping with the dense smoke Mrs. Court carried the baby to safety, while Mr. Court, assisted by Esso-Bowness of the Summerside Fire Department, located the source of the fire in the bed of the older children in the same room as the baby.

Smashing out a window in the bedroom they threw the burning bed clothes to the ground below, where it was extinguished by the firemen who had arrived in the meantime.

The fire is believed to have originated from a hot plate presumably turned on by the older children, and which in some way came in contact with the clothing on their bed.
