When picked up he was insensible, and the discovery was made that his right eye had been knocked out and his left leg badly cut near the knee. Mr. Reeves was insensible at latest accounts. WINTER COMMUNICATION!

STEAMER CHARTERED.

OTTAWA, Dec. 1. The steamer Neptune has been chartered for the winter mail service between the Island and the Mainland. She leaves Newfoundland for the Island to-morrow.

Ontario Elections.

OTTAWA, Nov. 30. In Peterborough east, Duncan McLeod, formerly a supporter of Mowat's Government, announced himself as a Protestant candidate. He arraigns Mowat for trucking to catch the Catholic vote and declares Mowat gave a man a timber limit worth \$6,000 for \$1,000 to get out of the way so as to give the registration to a Catholic. McLeod refuses to pledge himself to support Meredith.

Cattle Enraged.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Nov. 30. Several batts on the stock farm of J. W. Allen were burned this morning. Fifty-seven head of cattle were burned to death and a large amount of farming implements destroyed. Loss \$40,000.

Embezzlement.

PORTLAND, Me., Nov. 30. The directors of Canal National Bank authorize the statement that Howard E. Blackstone, discount clerk, has embezzled funds of the bank to the amount of \$25,000 and has absconded.

Absconded.

DENVER, Col., Nov. 30. F. L. Carier, cotton manager of the North Poudre Land and Canal Company, at Fort Collins, is supposed to have absconded. He owes \$305,000.

Another Fire.

MASON, Neb., Nov. 30. Mackendiroff's large general merchandise establishment was burned last night, and three men perished in their sleeping room on the upper floor.

A New Ballot Paper.

OTTAWA, Nov. 30. Earnest Fortin, of Quebec, has applied for a patent for a ballot paper, which, it is claimed, every one can comprehend and will prevent fraud.

Fishery Trouble.

HALIFAX, Nov. 30. Consul-General Phelan handed a check for \$1,000 to Customs Inspector Hill today, in final settlement of the Moro Castle case.

St. Andrew's Day.

OTTAWA, Nov. 30. The Governor General, Lady Lansdowne and suite, were present at the St. Andrew's Concert this evening. It was a great success.

Attempted Suicide.

HALIFAX, Nov. 30. George F. Stone, general merchant of Digby, attempted suicide by hanging yesterday, in consequence of business troubles.

A New Candidate.

LONDON, Nov. 30. The Standard says it is seriously proposed at Sofia to nominate an American as a candidate for the Bulgarian throne.

Killed.

MONTREAL, Nov. 30. Joseph Trudeau, working on the Canada Pacific bridge at St. Henri de Mascouche, fell 60 feet and was instantly killed.

Lottery.

QUEBEC, Nov. 30. A stone cutter, named Jacques Moisan, holds a ticket which took a prize in Father Labell's lottery.

Diphtheria.

QUEBEC, Nov. 30. Many fatal cases of diphtheria are reported about Dolisle. Two families lost eight children.

Y. M. C. A.

A visit to the well supplied reading room of the Y. M. C. A., with its excellent stock of papers and magazines, including the leading periodicals of two hemispheres, well repays the one who makes it.

In addition to the supply of general literature already to be found in the rooms; we understand that the Association purpose placing on their files special works, such as military papers for the benefit of the militia men; technical papers on mechanical subjects to suit the apprentice, journeyman and master-mechanic; a good musical journal, and not to be unmindful of the wishes of their lady friends and subscribers a leading fashion paper. While desiring to have the reading room as well equipped as possible; the Association, realizing that its special mission is to work for the benefit of young men morally, intellectually and spiritually, are endeavoring to extend their work in that direction, and are fitting up additional rooms as young men's parlors.

These rooms can be used by young men for social intercourse, etc. For the young men who have left their homes and come to the city, these rooms will take the place as far as possible of a home, in the way of association, conversation, etc.

For all young men an opportunity will be given to spend a profitable evening whenever they may desire, having club rooms, class rooms, parlors and reading room.

Hitherto the Association has not received the hearty support from the public that its merits deserve, and consequently has not been able to undertake all it desired. At a recent meeting of the members, a large committee of young men volunteered to wait upon their fellow citizens and endeavor to interest them in this good work, by inducing them to become members, and thus aid the work by their counsel and co-operation; also to solicit donations. We trust that our young friends will receive a hearty reception, and that their "hands will be upheld" in their praiseworthy endeavors, both by the money and prayers of the citizens of Charlottetown.

Supreme Court.

The Judges of the Supreme Court met to-day for the purpose of delivering judgments in the recent certiorari cases argued before them.

In the certiorari applications, arising out of the prosecutions under the Scott Act in this city, the writs were refused, the majority of the Court (the Chief Justice and Judge Hensley) being of opinion that Mr. Fitzgerald had not disqualified himself from sitting on the cases by reason of his having directed the policemen to lay the information. Mr. Justice Peters dissented, and was of opinion that no man could be both prosecutor and judge, and that inasmuch as Mr. Fitzgerald had personally directed one of the prosecutions to be commenced, he was, in fact, the real prosecutor, and therefore disqualified. Regarding the contention that Mr. Fitzgerald was held out of the fund arising out of the Scott Act, the Court was of opinion that this was not so, because the Order in Council directed the fines to be applied to the enforcement of the Act, and not to the general funds of the city.

Judgment was also delivered in the Patterson cases, which were applications for rules for certiorari to quash two convictions made by Alex. Hayden and A. F. Tomlin, two Justices of the Peace for King's County. The Court held that the convictions should be quashed, and ordered the writs to issue.

In these last cases the question of the

right of the Local Government to appoint Justices of the Peace was raised, but the Court did not decide it, as there were sufficient grounds without it to quash the convictions. Mr. Justice Peters, however, recommended immediate legislation to confirm the acts of all Justices appointed since Confederation, as the consequences of holding these appointments not valid would be serious, because every person arrested on a warrant issued by such Justice might sue him, as all his acts would be void.
