WE repeat, emphatically, the denial of the Patriot's charge about "the falsification of the Secretary of the school Board's Report by the Government in order to make the expenses of the Prince of Wales College and Normal School smaller than they are." We challenge the Patriot to prove this charge. The Patriot is entirely wrong; and its editor has evidently never taken the trouble to enquire into the truth of a libellous report with which he has certainly been stuffed. We have not asked the Secretary of the School Board for a denial of the charge; for the Patriot, having made it, should be prepared to prove it.

MR. BEER is resorting to very mean practices, in order to prejudice the electors against the Hon. Donald Ferguson. At a public meeting, recently, Mr. Beer stated that the imported horse "Barrister" was sold by the Government, and purchased by Messrs. Gardner and McLeod, who now charge \$25.00 for the use of the horse. It is true that the horse was sold by public auction and purchased by Mr. J. D. McLeod, of this city, who now owns him. Neither Mr. Gardner nor Hon. Neil McLeod ever owned any interest in the horse. It is untrue that Mr. J. D. McLeod charges \$25.00 for the use of "Barrister." His charges are exactly the same as the amount charged by the Government last year. The farmers of this County can avail themselves of the services of "Barrister" as cheaply as they did last season, while the Government do not incur the expense and risk of keeping him at the Stock Farm. We have always contended that no studs should be kept on the Stock Farm. It is the duty of the Government to import them and, on their arrival, dispose of them by public auction in such a way as to accommodate the different sections of the Province. Mr. Beer must be hard up for argument when he manufactures untruths of this character to injure the Government.

The snow storm was heavy along the Railway yesterday. From six to eight feet of snow were reported in the cuttings, and the trains were thereby delayed. The train from Tignish was detained east of Freetown, and is now now fighting a short distance west of Broadstairs. The train which left this city for Summerside yesterday was snowed up a mile west of County Line, and did not arrive at Summerside until 1.20 this afternoon. The express train for Georgetown, with two engines, which left this city at 7 o'clock p. m., was also detained by heavy snow, and did not arrive at Georgetown until 10 o'clock this morning. Eastern trains are running on time to-day, and the trains to and from Summerside were cancelled.
