

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 29. The real estate "boom" has reached a perfect fever. Property all over the city and in the suburbs is in demand at extraordinary figures. Quite a number of strangers have made fortunes in the last few weeks.

OTTAWA, Nov. 29.

Messrs. Currie, Laine & Co., of Quebec, have orders to build 150 cars for the Inter-colonial Railway.

Several city contractors are engaged in preparing tenders for that section of the Canadian Pacific Railroad, from Emory to Point Moody. Immediately after his election by acclamation for Quebec County, on Friday, the Hon. Mr. Garneau announced his intention to contribute \$400 to the poor of the city.

A new through line is talked of here, between Montreal and Chicago. The movers in the enterprise propose utilizing the Occidental to Ottawa, thence by Canadian Pacific to Brockville, thence by Utica and Black River to Merrisburg, and thence by the Lake Shore to Chicago. A meeting is shortly to be held by the parties interested.

The renowned Hungarian mills, better known in the Lower Provinces as the "Howard Mills," 2 1/2 miles from Ridgeway were totally destroyed by fire yesterday. A large quantity of wheat and flour was consumed. The mill had a manufacturing capacity of 150 bbls., per day.

Mr. Laurin, of the firm of Laurin & Sons, Barbadoes, is at Montreal. In conversation with a reporter, he expressed it as his opinion that an important lumber and general trade could be opened with the Island of Barbadoes and the neighboring Islands of Dominica and Grenada, if direct steam communication existed with the Dominion. He said it was quite possible for our new Brazilian line of steamers to stop on the way.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.

In Guitau's trial this morning, after some preliminary remarks by Scoville, and the introduction of testimony relating to the death of the prisoner's uncle in Binghamton Insane Asylum, the prisoner was asked to take the stand, which he did; but at once demurred against being formally examined, saying he was not feeling well. Some discussion ensued between the counsel and Guitau, who finally left the stand, while Scoville read several old letters of the prisoner's to show the condition of his mind years ago. During the reading the prisoner paid close attention, constantly interrupting to explain passages from them. At 12 o'clock Guitau again took the stand, and Scoville plied him with questions, calling out the history of his career. Frequently Guitau became excited, and pounded the desk of the witness box vigorously, and especially when he described his life in the Onondaga community. He gave somewhat in detail an account of his past life and experiences, in his peculiar manner and was not interrupted by opposing counsel. Before his story was completed the court adjourned.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.

The Lighthouse Board received a cablegram from the Secretary of the Dublin Lighthouse Board this morning, confirming the injuries received by Calif Rock Lighthouse, County Cork, during the recent gales, and stating that the light will be extinguished until further notice.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 29.

The steamer South Carolina, from Panama, brought Capt. Currie, his wife, and two children, and four seamen of the British barque Sarah, from Hull for San Francisco, which was burned in the South Pacific. Capt. Currie related a tale of suffering. They were twenty-three days in an open boat under a tropical sun. The remainder of the crew left in two open boats, which became separated from the captain's and as yet are unheard from. The South Carolina also brought a number of destitute seamen belonging to the British barque Alwick Castle, and the American barque J. B. Bell, which were wrecked during the recent cyclone in Manzanilla's harbor; also the crews of the wrecked barque Antioch and schooner Good Templar.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

Lord Lorne and Princess Louise are visiting the Queen at Windsor Castle today.

LONDON, Nov. 29.

Lefroy was hanged shortly after 9 this morning. Only a small crowd gathered outside of the jail. They were apprised of the execution by the hoisting of a black flag. Lefroy slept well last night. He was silent on the way from the cell to the scaffold, but his expression was ghastly. The drop was nine feet. Death was instantaneous.

LONDON, Nov. 29.

The Times says it believes Parliament will meet on the 19th of January, and that the recommendation of Government for the conduct of business in the Commons will be forthwith introduced.

LONDON, Nov. 29.

Mr. O'Donnell arrived at Londonderry last night and addressed an enormous crowd. He advised the electors to vote against the nominee of the Coercion Government for Parliament. He has interviewed Parnell, Dillon, O'Kelly, and Kenny in Kilmainham jail, and says the suspects have the look of men whose health is being steadily undermined.

TERMS OF UNION.

SECTION 7.—That the Dominion Government shall assume and defray all the charges for the following services, viz:

SUB-SECTION J.—Efficient steam service for the conveyance of mails and passengers to be established and maintained between the Island and the mainland of the Dominion, winter and summer, thus placing the Island in continuous communication with the Inter-colonial Railway, and the Railway system of the Dominion.

As heretofore, THE EXAMINER will, in 1882, advocate the introduction of improvements calculated to advance the interests of Prince Edward Island, in particular, and the great Dominion of which we form a part, in general.

THE EXAMINER is in favor of cutting down the Local Legislature, consolidating the Local Civil Service on a sound business basis, maintaining a system of rigid economy in the administration of local affairs, and applying the money thus saved to the advancement of the Agricultural and Industrial interests of the Province.

THE EXAMINER's policy shall be, as it has been, first National and then Political; first for the Island, next for Canada, and then for the Party by which both are governed.

Articles on Practical Agriculture will form a prominent feature of THE EXAMINER during 1882; and our columns will, as heretofore, be well filled with news and interesting miscellany.

CIVIC ELECTION BY THE MAYOR.

IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intitled "An Act to amend the Act of the Eighteenth Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intitled 'An Act to Incorporate the Town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same'" I do hereby give Public Notice that an

Election for One Person to Serve as Common Councilman in the City Council for Ward Number Five of said City,

in place of Henry B. SMITH, Esquire, resigned, will be held on

MONDAY,

the Fifth Day of December, A. D. 1881,

at the place following, that is to say:

In Ward No. 5, at or near the House of Widow Tierney, corner of Great George and Easton Streets.

And at the said Election the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

DESCRIPTION OF WARD.

Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies North of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said Town.

Nomination of Mayor and Councillors.

Act 43 Victoria: "Seven days before the time of any and every Election for Mayor or Councillors, the persons candidates for the office of Mayor or Councillor shall give their names in as such candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences, and addition of such persons 'together with the office and Wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination by such candidate.'"

"There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor, at the same time, a fee of ten dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councillor a fee of five dollars, which sums shall go towards paying the cost of the election."

"No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councillor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid."

The time appointed for the nomination of candidates shall be from the time of Twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose.

Qualification of Electors. See Act 43, cap. 15, sec. 20 and 64.
