### Drowning Is Avoided By Girl's Classmates

**SOURIS**—Quick action by two young Souris girls yesterday afternoon averted what might have resulted in a drowning fatality at Central Wharf, Souris.

13-year-old Shirley Osborne, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Osborne, Souris, had just completed a swimming class, when she tumbled from the wharf into the harbor. In falling she struck and injured herself on a metal ledge attached to the side of the wharf at water level.

Two of her class-mates, Kathy Mahar, 12-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Mahar, Souris, and Clare Peters, 13, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Peters, saw Shirley's plight as they were climbing a ladder on the side of the wharf.

"The two managed to reach out into the water and grab Shirley and hauled her up onto the wharf, where an unknown motorist transferred her to the Souris Hospital.

Hospital officials reports that she had suffered cuts and abrasions to her leg and hip and her right foot. The injured girl is reported to be resting comfortably and will be detained in the hospital until this morning for observation.

There were several days recently when the draggers could not get out, and others when they could not operate effectively because of the rough water, it was stated.

There is plenty of fish on the fishing grounds, and normal catches should be realized again when the fish return to the bottom, and the weather improves, one dragger captain stated. All Souris draggers were out today.

### Huge Fisheries Project At Georgetown Confirmed

A multi-million dollar fisheries development that will ultimately employ about 700 men in the department of public works, and the expansion of this operation will be revealed in stages as we progress.

Following a meeting of his cabinet, the premier said that the government has reached a decision to co-operate with a Canadian company in the development of a fully integrated fish and processing plant to be located at Georgetown.

He said the first stage of the new development in Georgetown will be the construction of a \$1,000,000 plant, to be started next spring and in production by fall. The provincial government will provide approximately \$700,000 of the initial investment.

"This amount," the premier said, "is what we are making available for the present and the development expenses, if additional funds are required."

He will re-examine the whole program.

**LAGGER FLEET**

There have been indications that the whole development will eventually involve a dragger fleet to complement the plant and the over-all cost of the operation will be in the neighborhood of five or six million dollars.

According to Premier Shaw, "discussions have been proceeding for some time and representatives of the concern involved have been in the province on a number of occasions and we have had a thorough examination of the suitability and advantages of the Island."

"As a result of these investigations, the Georgetown site has been selected as an excellent location for establishment of the plant. Agreement has been reached on a basic satisfactory to the government and the contract company."

Premier Shaw said Donald F. Rennie, C.A., Montreal, a spokesman for the contract company, said "Georgetown and Prince Edward Island were chosen because of the combined fishing and agricultural potential we have found, and because of its location in particular because of its proximity to the water and the wharf."

Mr. Coles' Country View Adele produced 8,625 milk, 536 fat for BCAs of 117 and 124 and his River North Mamie 1,582 milk, 514 fat for BCAs of 122 and 120.

Mr. Coles also had a junior two-year old heifer quality with 7,960 milk, 468 fat for BCAs of 125 and 120.

Mr. Coles' A. S. Vickerson, North River also had a junior two-year old heifer quality with 6,300 milk, 438 fat for BCAs of 102 and 131.
