Dwelling At Mt. Albion Lost In Fire Monday
Fire yesterday demolished the two-story dwelling of Lester Buell, Mt. Albion, whose neighbors halted the blaze early in the afternoon, but were unable to quell a subsequent flare-up. The lack of telephone communication, resulting from strong winds during the day, prevented the summoning of aid in time to prevent the loss, while the neighbors' efforts, successful at first, ultimately proved unequal to the task.
The fire, whose origin was unknown at press-time, broke out shortly after noon, and was brought under control with only the roof sustaining serious damage. A few hours later, however, the dwelling began to burn again, and by early evening was a total loss. Telephone communications on the Hillsborough exchange were not restored in time to summon effective help.

Parkdale - Royalty To Have United Church Before Fall

Approval of the Official Board of Trinity Church has been given to the building of a church in the Parkdale-Royalty area and the establishment of the territory as a separate pastoral charge.
The decision was reached last evening after a series of meetings and surveys which now show that out of 215 families, more than eighty per cent are entirely in favour of such a move.
The families in the Parkdale-Royalty area will continue to enjoy the facilities of the Charlotte-town church until such time as the new church is erected and it is agreed that Trinity Church will give substantial support to the Parkdale Church over a period of three years.

SITE DONATED
A site of land comprising two acres situated on Palmer's Lane has been donated by Mr. Stewart MacKay and it is proposed to start erection of the new building so as to have it ready for occupancy by next fall.
Rev. Howard Christie who proposed the building of the Parkdale church said there is a potential of 250 families to be served in the area. He pointed out that there are at present 250 children of Sunday school age.
In a general discussion which took place it was estimated that the new church would involve a cost of approximately \$30,000. The area to be included in the charge would take in all the homes north of the railroad tracks with the exception of the portion of Kensington Road which lies within the City limits.
